

Over 75% of the questionnaires were returned. The comments were extremely kind—and for this we are humbly grateful; the criticisms were constructive and for this we are doubly grateful.


In this issue, there is another questionnaire for our readers who do not live in Calgary.

ALBERTA AGRICULTURAL CENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

Work is now proceeding on a written history of the farm movement in Alberta. This is one of the projects undertaken by the Alberta Agricultural Centennial Committee.

This committee, set up by member organizations of the Alberta Federation of Agriculture, consists of some twenty representatives of agricultural organizations and associations throughout the province.

A substantial part of the history was written by the late Mr. Norman Priestley, who was manager of the U.F.A. Co-op from 1940-1951, and who devoted considerable time in the interests of farm organizations in Alberta.

Research and writings for the periods 1921 to 1935 and 1949 to 1967 remain to be done. For the completion of the work, the Committee commissioned Mr. E. B. Swindlehurst, former Research Information Editor for the Alberta Department of Agriculture.
