





# Last Week

Alvin objects to Christianity based on this issue. How should Carol respond?



#### Middle Knowledge and Christian Exclusivism

William Lane Craig

#### SUMMARY

Daniel hart has orticated a middle knowledge perspective on Christian anclassivem on everagellation and metaphysical grounds. 

## **Exclusivism (The Targeted View)**



To be saved, it is necessary to know about the work of Jesus and exercise faith in Him before you die. The means of salvation is exclusively through human messengers.

It stresses that Jesus is the only Savior.
It emphasizes evangelism and missions.

Salvation is not universally accessible.



Central points - Cornelius was saved after responding to the gospel. Had he died before Peter arrived, he would have been damned.





# Inclusivism (Wider Hope View)



God saves people because of the work of Christ, but it is not necessary to know the gospel message. One must respond in faith to God as revealed through General Revelation before you die.




- Emphasizes Jesus as ontologically necessary.
- Offers universally accessible salvation.
- Does not require explicit faith in Christ.
- De-emphasizes missions.



**Central points** - Cornelius was a *believer*, with faith in God, before receiving the gospel. He became a *Christian* after receiving the gospel. Had he died before Peter arrived, he would've been saved.





# Postmortem Evangelism (Afterlife Message)



Those who die unevangelized receive an opportunity for salvation after death. No one is saved without explicit knowledge of Christ. It is not a second chance view, but a first chance view. Only those who explicitly disbelieve in Christ will be condemned. It is not an indefinite offer.




- Emphasizes ontological and epistemological necessity of Jesus.
- Salvation is universally accessible.
- De-emphasizes missions.
- Likely misinterprets key scriptures.



Central points - Cornelius was saved after responding to the gospel. Had he died before Peter arrived, he would have an opportunity to hear the gospel in the afterlife.





# Universal Evangelism (God sends the message)



If people respond to general revelation, by the prompting of the Holy Spirit, God will send the gospel message to them, whether by human messenger, dreams, visions, or angels.




Emphasizes ontological and epistemological necessity of Jesus. Offers universally accessible salvation.

De-emphasizes the need for human agents.



**Central points** - God made sure Cornelius received the gospel message because Cornelius had responded in faith to the light given to him.

- Although evangelical responses to this topic are not dogmatic conclusions, we can use critical reason to harmonize the two premises that:
  - (i) Jesus is the only way of salvation and
  - (ii) God desires all people to be saved.
- When evaluating competing views of debatable issues in Christianity, it is important to:

Consider and evaluate the theological assumptions that guide the interpretation of the key scriptures that are used as support.
