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
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
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INTRODUCTION

As I send forth this book I desire to thank all who have rendered assistance in collecting material. I regret the genealogy is not more complete. Many names of Southworths have been obtained who could not be assigned to any family, nor traced to known ancestors.

It must be that mistakes and contradictions will be found in the record. Dates and names obtained from different sources have not been the same. Accounts of members of families have not agreed with town records nor with each other. When it has been impossible to decide which is the more probably correct, both are given, one in parentheses.

Other Southworths than the children of Edward and Alice came to this country. A Thomas Southard was in Hempstead, L. I., as early as 1650. Francis Southworth, with his servant Thomas Yates, came to Virginia in 1672. Samuel Southworth, born in Ireland in 1756, came probably in the latter half of the eighteenth century. He had two wives and fourteen children. More recently two brothers came, whose children are in Lynn and Fall River.

The uniform testimony has been that the descendants of Constant Southworth have shown the virtue, courage, faith, and righteousness which they have inherited from their early ancestor. The large majority have been God-fearing citizens; many have been officers in church, town, and state, upholding the religion of Christ and building well for the nation's future.



These few items are all that is given in regard to the life of Edward Southworth in Leyden by the records so far published. Governor Bradford has preserved for us the only other document relating to him, — a letter written by his friend, Robert Cushman, from Dartmouth, England, when the "Mayflower" and "Speedwell" put ir there on account of the unseaworthy condition of the latter.

To his loving friend Ed[ward] S[outhworth] at Henige in the Duke Place, [London],*

DARTMOUTH; [Thursday,] August 17, anno 16

LOVING FRIEND. My most kind remembrance to you, and yo wife, with loving E. M. &c.; whom in this world I never look to again. For, besides the eminent [imminent] dangers of this Voyal which are no less than deadly, an infirmity of the body hath seize me which will not, in all likelihood, leave me till death. What to call it, I know not. But it is a bundle of lead, as it were crushin my heart more and more these days, 14 days, as that, although do the actions of a living man, yet I am but as dead. But the world GOD be done.

Our pinnace, [the "Speedwell"] will not cease leaking; else, I thin we had been half way to Virginia. Our voyage hither hath been full of crosses as ourselves have been of crookedness. We put here to trim her; and I think, as others also, if we had stayed for four hours more, she would have sunk right do

red at [South]hampton; yet now sha

a man might have pulled off with his fingers; where the water came in as at a mole hole.

We lay at [South]hampton seven days in fair weather, waiting for her: and now we lie here for her in as fair a wind as can blow, and have done these four days [13–17 August]; and are likely to lie four more [they actually left on 23d August], and by that time the wind will happily turn, as it did at [South]hampton. Our victuals will be half eaten up, I think, before we go from the coast of England; and, if our voyage last long, we shall not have a month's

victuals when we come in the country.

Nearly £700 hath been bestowed [spent] at [South]hampton, upon what I know not. Master [Christopher] Martin saith, he neither can, nor will, give account of it. And if he be called upon for accounts; he crieth out of unthankfulness for his pains and care, that we are suspicious of him; and flings away, and will end nothing. Also he so insulteth over our poor people [the Leyden Pilgrims], with such scorn and contempt, as if they were not good enough to wipe his shoes. It would break your heart to see his dealing, and the mourning of our people. They complain to me; and, alas, I can do nothing for them. If I speak to him, he flies in my face, as if I were mutinous; and saith, No complaints shall be heard or received but by himself; and saith They are froward and waspish discontented people, and I do Ill to hear them. There are others that would lose all they have put in, or make satisfaction for what they have had, that they might depart: but he will not hear them; nor suffer them to go ashore, lest they should run away.

The sailors also are so offended at his ignorant boldness in meddling and controling in things he knows not what belongs to [them], as that some threaten to mischief him. Others say, They will leave the ship, and go their way. But at best, this cometh of it, that he makes himself a scorn and a laughing stock unto them.

As for Master Weston, except grace do greatly sway with him, he will hate us ten times more than he ever loved us, for not confirming the Conditions. But now since some pinches have taken them, they begin to reveal the truth, and say Master Robinson was in fault, who charged them never to consent to those Conditions, nor choose me to office; but indeed appointed them to choose them they did choose. But he and they will rue too late. They may now see all and be ashamed when it is too late, that they were so ignorant, yea, and so inordinate in their courses. I am sure as they were resolved not to seal those conditions, I was not so resolute at [South]hampton to have left the whole business, except they would seal them: and better the Voyage to have broken off then, than to have brought such misery to ourselves, dishonor to GOD, and detriment to our loving friends, as now it is likely to do. Four or five of the chief of them which came from Leyden, came resolved never to go on those conditions.

And Master Christopher Martin, he said, he never received no money on those Conditions! He was not beholden to the Merchants for mpin! they were bloodsuckers! and I know not what. Simple Mert, He indeed never made any Conditions with the Merchants, feared er spake with them: but did [made] all that money [the £700]

fly at [South]hampton, or was it his own? Who will go and lay out money so rashly as he did; and never know how he comes by it, or

on what conditions?

Secondly, I told him of the alteration long ago, and he especially considering how scant we shall be of victuals; and, most of all, ununited amongst ourselves, and devoid of good tutors and regiment [leaders and organisation]. Violence will break all. Where is the meek and humble spirit of Moses? and of Nehemiah, who reedified the walls of Jerusalem, and the state of Israel? Is not the sound of Rehoboam's brags daily heard amongst us? Have not the philosophers and all wise men observed that, even in settled Commonwealths, violent Governors bring, either themselves, or the people, or both, to ruin? How much more in the raising of Common Wealths, when the mortar is yet scarce tempered that should bind the walls?

If I should write to you all things which promiscuously forerun our ruin, I should overcharge my weak head, and grieve your tender heart: Only this I pray you, Prepare for evil tidings of us, every day! But pray for us instantly [without ceasing]! It may be the Lord will be intreated, one way or other, to make for us. I see not in reason, how we shall escape, even the gasping of hunger-starved

persons: But GOD can do much; and his will be done!

It is better for me to die, than now for me to bear it: which I do daily, and expect it hourly; having received the sentence of death both within and without me. Poor William King and myself do strive Who shall be meat first for the fishes; but we look for a glorious resurrection, knowing Christ Jesus after the flesh no more: but looking unto the joy that is before us, we will endure all things, and account them light in comparison of that joy we hope for.

Remember me in all love to our friends, as if I named them: whose prayers I desire earnestly, and wish again to see them; but not till I can, with more comfort look them in the face. The Lord

give us that true comfort which none can take from us!

I had a desire to make a brief Relation of our estate to some friend. I doubt not but your wisdom will teach you seasonably to utter things, as hereafter you shall be called to it. That which I have written is true; and many things more, which I have foreborne. I write it, as upon my life and last confession in England. What is of use to be spoken of presently, you may speak of it; and what is fit to conceal, conceal! Pass by my weak manner! for my head is weak, and my body feeble. The Lord make me strong in him, and keep both you and yours!

That such a man as Robert Cushman could so unburden himself to Edward Southworth reveals to us the lovely character of this "loving friend," as Cushman calls him. The fact that he gives him permission to make what use of the letter he thinks best, "revealing part, or concealing the whole," shows also Cushman's confide in Southworth's discretion, good judgment, and his power to

secret. No one could write such a letter to one whom he did not believe worthy of confidence.

At this time Southworth was in London, at the Henige House in the Duke Place. We can readily think that a desire to be near his friends, who were starting on their venturesome voyage, led him to go to England. He must be with his friends to the last minute, so he bids them farewell at Southampton, then goes to London, not expecting to hear from them until after their arrival in the New World.

For some reason, though one of the church of Leyden and bound by strong ties of friendship to several of those who sailed, he did not deem it best to go, with his wife and two young boys, on the hazardous voyage. The tender age of those boys may have been one reason; a weightier one may have been his own poor health; he died seven years after his marriage, as Nathaniel Morton tells us in his poem upon Mistress Alice Bradford; so he died in England during that first winter when so many of his former companions were laying down their lives in the wilderness of America. Morton speaks of him as "one whose grace and virtue did surpasse"; nor was this a compliment to fill out a poet's license or rhythm.

Of the early life of Alice Carpenter we know nothing. She was born about 1590, for she was nearly eighty when she died in 1670. Her father was Alexander Carpenter, her mother's name is unknown. She had four sisters, Agnes, Julia Ann, Priscilla, and Mary; perhaps a brother William, who came over in 1638 with his son William, and settled in Weymouth. Agnes married Dr. Samuel Fuller, died in Leyden; Julia Ann married George Morton, came in 1628; Priscilla married William Wright, came in 1621. Mary did not marry and came later, as shown by the following letter, printed by Frederick Kidder in the N. E. H. & G. R., 1860, p. 195, which he considers to be genuine, copied from a copy, written by Governor Bradford, inviting her to come to the new world.

LOVING SISTER,

We understand by your letter, that God hath taken to himself our aged mother out of the troubles of this tumultuous world, and that you are in a solitary condition as we easily apprehend. We thought good therefore to writ these few lines unto you that if you think good to come over to us you shall be wellcome, and we shall be as helpfull unto you as we may, though we are grown old and the countrie here more unsettled than ever by reason of great changes that have been in these late times, and what will further be the Lord only knows which makes many thinke of removing their habitations, and sundrie of our ministers (hearing of the peace and libert, now in England and Ireland) begine to leave us and it is feared many more will follow. We do not write these things to

discourage you (for we shall be glad to see you if God so dispose) but if you find not all things here according to your expectation when God shall bring you hither that you may not thinke we did not plainly with you. This bearer is to come as nere you as Dorchester and hath promised to see this letter safely conveyed to you, and if you can write or send to him he will give you the best directions and furtherance he can about your coming over. His occation will be most at London: He dwells here with us and is to return this next year; he is a brother to Mr. Winslow. But we conceive your best and easiest way will be to come from Bristol if there be any passage. And if you cannot pay for your passage agree with the master and I will pay it here. We have sent letters formerly we'n we perceive have miscarried but I hope this will come safe to your hands. The rest of your friends are all in Health Blessed be God. We hope you will have such opportunity as your passage will be comfortable, thus desiring the Lord to keepe you and bring you in saftie, with our love remembered unto you, we take leave and rest.

To his very Loving Sister Mary Carpenter at Wrington in Somersetshire some 8 myles from Bristoll these be d'd This letter to be left, at the House of Joseph Leggat near the sign of the rose in Ratcliff Street in Bristol to be conveyed as above said.

Tradition reports that Alice Carpenter and William Bradford loved each other early; but the maid's father was unwilling they should wed and selected Edward Southworth for his daughter as being the more desirable party from his social rank. This may have been, and the fact that she so readily came to Bradford in 1623 would lend credence to the tradition.*

Be that as it may, after her husband's death in England, and after Bradford's wife Dorothy was drowned in Provincetown Harbor, Alice Southworth came over at the next opportunity in 1623 and a few weeks after her arrival she became William Bradford's wife. At that time young Thomas Cushman, a lad of sixteen, was a member of Bradford's family, having been left in the Governor's care by his father, Robert Cushman, when he returned to England on the "Fortune" to look after the interest of the colonists in that country, the father expecting to return soon and make his home in New Plymouth with his old Leyden friends; but he never again saw his son, as he died in 1625 before he could leave England.

Alice Southworth left her two boys in England in the care of

relatives when she came here in 1623; probably they were left with their aunt Julia, who married George Morton, as they came over with her in 1628.*

When her two sons came to her, the family of Governor Bradford consisted of himself and his wife Alice, Thomas Cushman, Constant and Thomas Southworth, thirteen and twelve years old, and his three children by Alice, the oldest four years old.

The earlier settlers of Plymouth Colony endured many hardships and suffered from an insufficient supply of food. The worst of their suffering was before Alice Southworth's arrival, but there was vet for some months great deficiency of the necessities of life. Bradford says of this time:

"many were ragged in aparell & some little better than halfe naked. . . . The best dish they could presente their friends with was a lobster, or a peece of fish, without bread or anything els but a cupp of fair spring water. And ye long continuance of this diate and their labours abroad had something abated ye freshness of their former complexion. But God gave them health and strength in a good measure."

A brief sketch of the conditions under which the settlement was made will help to explain the cause of this want and show some of the peculiar relations of the colonists, and give a more correct view of the life to which Alice Southworth entered from love to Bradford and devotion to her religious faith; in these surroundings Constant and Thomas Southworth received the training and discipline which developed them into the worthy men they proved to be.

While considering where they should go, the Pilgrims at Leyden were visited by Thomas Weston, who gave them assurance of help and persuaded them to continue negotiations with the "Merchant Adventurers," and declared that he would guarantee their transportation.†

Robert Cushman and John Carver — at another time, William Brewster — were sent to England to negotiate with the Merchant Adventurers in regard to the Pilgrims going to America. These

In 1623, in the allotment of land, Alice Bradford receives one share with those who came over in the ship called "Ann." The two children are not mentioned, though other children are. In 1627, at the division of cattle, neither Constant nor Thomas is included in Governor Brad-

negotiations were chiefly with Thomas Weston. I believe it is not known who was the author of the articles of agreement as finally drawn up, to which Robert Cushman felt forced to consent, lest the whole scheme should fall through and thus many be great losers. The fifth section of the agreement was the cause of much of their trouble, and that was the one to which the Pilgrims most strongly objected. This section was:

"5. That at ye end of ye 7 years ye capitall & profits, viz. the houses, lands, goods and chatles, be equally divided betwixt ye adventurers, and planters: we done, every man shall be free from other of them of any debt or detrimente concerning this adventure."

The opposition to this arose from the fact that no one would own his house or land, and the people would not work to the best advantage. The result was as anticipated, and hence the colonists for several years did not raise enough to supply their own wants. The Adventurers in London were looking for profits to be gained from trade with the natives and from receiving the products of the country, and neglected to send food and supplies. Hence arose serious scarcity. Also other immigrants came, bringing not enough for themselves and drawing upon the scanty store of the Pilgrims to supply their needs.

Annually one acre of land was allotted to each person to cultivate for himself and family. In 1624, on account of the remonstrances against this annual division, Governor Bradford gave each his acre of land in perpetuity. After that corn enough was raised to supply their own wants and there was a surplus for sale. Then the women, who had not worked in the field, felt there was an object to be gained in helping to till their own acre, and worked with their husbands in increasing the amount of the harvest. After this there was no scarcity.

Thomas Weston, who wrote July 8, 1621, "I promise you I will never quit ye business, though all other Adventurers should," was the first and the only one who forsook them, and that before he so much as heard of the return of their ship (the "Fortune") or knew what was done.

April 10 he sold out and then sent his brother, Andrew, on the coast to make a settlement. Andrew's company knew little about Indians, were not fitted to make a settlement, and were a trial to Bradford and the Pilgrims, who were obliged to look out for their welfare, lest they should be massacred by the natives. Thomas Weston did not succeed and finally went to Virginia.

Several companies of immigrants came to Plymouth Colony, containing elements not in harmony with those who first settled there.

Some of these undesirable persons wandered off to a distance, some returned to England, others caused more or less trouble.

The Adventurers unwisely sent a number who were not to be subject to the original agreement. They were given land a few miles away; yet they could not but be a discordant element in the plantation, and aided the discontented in stirring up trouble. It is a wonder there was not more dissatisfaction; the fact that harmony prevailed so generally among the true Pilgrims shows how firmly knit together they were, and how genuine was their religious harmony.

Into this community, which was just emerging from a semi-famine and was still suffering from the defection of Thomas Weston and the presence of inharmonious elements, into such a community came Alice Southworth, to become the wife of its Governor upon whom fell the chief burden of controlling the discordant members.

The Pilgrims had left Holland without their beloved pastor, Rev. John Robinson. He had died. They felt the need of a minister. The Adventurers sent one, Lyford, who turned out to be a thoroughly unprincipled, lying knave; who could profess repentance for his knavery with tears coursing down his cheeks, and in a few weeks be plotting again to stir up strife and discord. His trial showed his villainy. It is too long a story to give here; it was one more trial to tax the patience and loving forbearance of the Governor.

We must think of Alice Bradford as enduring the hardship and privations of those later early years and aiding her husband to bear the burden, cheering him and lightening his tasks, as a loving wife can, when seeming friends proved to be enemies or so half-hearted as to desert the young colony before it was fairly established.

Little or nothing is said about her in the records of the time; for her place was in the quiet of the home, in the retirement of domestic life. It must have been, however, that her teaching, her character, her life made their impression upon the young men of the household, every one of whom afterwards took a worthy place in the colonial life.

Thomas Cushman felt that influence from the time she first entered the home as Alice Bradford, when he was fifteen or sixteen years old. Constant and Thomas Southworth, her first children, had had her care until they were seven and eight years old, then for five years were probably with their aunt and had not their mother's oversight, when at twelve and thirteen they again became inmates of her home. William and Joseph Bradford, her children, of course had their mother's training from infancy. These five boys, as men prominent in Plymouth Colony and government, testify to Alice

(Southworth) Bradford as a woman of unusual mold, a lovely, faithful Christian woman, whose influence was a blessing to all.

Governor Bradford died in 1657; Alice Bradford survived him until 1670. It seems probable that she was an invalid and suffered much for some time, probably years, before her death. There is a note of pity in the record of her death, as though the sadness could not be briefly told; "loved while she lived, and lamented though old when she died." Nathaniel Morton says of her

"To about fourscore years she did attaine, But shee afflicted much with heavy paine: As Moses saith, her strength but sorrow was."

Her nephew, Nathaniel Morton, wrote an ode to her memory, which is to be seen secured to the cover of Governor Bradford's manuscript of Pilgrim Plantation.

"Upon the life and death of that godly matron, Mistris Alice Bradford widdow, late deceased on the 27 day of March, Anno; Dom; 1670, and was interred at Plymouth on the 30th of the same month.

"Heer lyes the shaddow of a blessed mother In Israel, well knowne to one and other, Of good decent of holy predecessors; Her father equal was to the confessors And holy martires, suffered for Chris sake, Altho hee suffered not att fierv stake. And shee with him and other in her youth Left theire owne native country for the truth, And in successe of time she marryed was To one whose grace and vertue did surpasse, I mean good Edward Southworth, who not long Continued in this world the saints amonge. With him shee lived seven years a wife, Till death did put a period to his life. And in some space of time, by God's good hand, Shee was brought over into New England, And in short time the Lord did so dispose, That Mr. William Bradford shee did choose To be her second husband; whom to fame I need not, for it is enough to name The name of Bradford fresh in memory. Which smeles with odoriforos fragrance. With him shee lived a wife years thirty four, Till God saw good his time should be no more In this sad world, but tooke him hence to heaven, Anno one thousand six hundred fifty seven. E'r since that time in widdowhood shee hath Lived a life in holiness and faith, In reading of Gods word and contemplation, Which healped her to asurance of salvation

Through Gods good sperit working with the same, For ever praised be his holy name. To about fourscore years shee did attaine, But shee afflicted much with heavy paine: As Moses saith, her strength but sorrow was, And shee to eternall rest made hast apace. Shee now with holy Abram hath attained A good old age. Her life was never stained With any sin that any one could call Remarkable, notorious, capitall, But contrarywise she lived soe As silence might the most malignant foe Shee had, or any other that professe The waies of Christ and of just righteousness. Tis sad to see our houses dispossessed Of holy saints whose memory is blessed: When they decease and closed are in tombe. Theres few or none that rises in their rome That's like to them in holiness and grace. Which makes our times looke with so sad a face. Her glasse is run, her worke is done, and shee Is happy unto all eternity. Lett her relations all and every one Take her example, doe as shee hath done, In love to God his waies and one another. Then they Will well improve theire blessed mother. Her holy, blessed, example, That gives a gracious presedent soe ample To them and unto all both one and other That follow may after this blessed mother. Ile multiply noe more words but ab . . . e That I dare use concerning her dear . . . e Adoe, my loving friend, my aunt, my mother, Of those that's left I have not such another."

The last will and Testament of Mistress Alice Bradford Senn^r of Plymouth deceased; exhibited to the Court att Plymouth in New England the 7th day of June Ann^o: Dom. 1670 on the oathes of Nathaniel Morton and Lieut. Ephraim Morton: as followeth;

"I allis Bradford senir of the Towne of Plymouth in the Jurisdiction of New England widdow: being weake in body but of disposing mind and perfect memory blessed be God; not knowing how soone the Lord may please to take mee out of this world unto himselfe; doe make and ordaine this to be my last will and Testament, in manner and forme as followeth; Imps: I bequeath my soule to god that gaue it and my body to the dust in hope of a Joyfull Resurrection vnto Glory desiring that my body may be Intered as near vnto my deceased husband; Mr William Bradford: as Conveniently may be; and as for my worldly estate I dispose of it as followeth: Impris: I give and bequeath vnto my deare sister, Mary Carpenter: the bed I now lye on with the furniture therevnto belonging and a paire of sheets and a good Cow and a yearling heiffer and a young

mare Item I give and bequeath vnto my son Mr. Constant Southworth my Land at Paometty viz: all my Purchase land there: with all my Rights Privilidges and appurtenances therevuto belonging: To him and his heires and assignes for ever: Item I give and bequeath vnto my said Constant Southworth . . . and vnto my son Mr. Joseph Bradford: the one halfe of my sheep to be equally deuded betwixt them; and the other halfe to my son Captaine William Bradford Item I give vnto my said son Joseph Bradford my paire of working oxen and a white heffer; Item I give vnto my honored friend Mr Thomas Prence one of the books were my dear husbands library; which of them hee shall choose; Item I give vnto my deare Grandchild Elizabeth Howland; the daughter of my deare son Captaine Thomas Southworth deceased; the some of seauen pounds; for the vse and benefit of her son James howland Item I give vnto my servant maide Mary Smith a Cow Calfe to be deliuered her the next springe if I decease this winter and if I doe not decease this winter; my will is that shee haue one deliuered to her out of my estate in som short time after my decease: all the rest of my estate not disposed of already by this my last will and Testament; as aboue said; I give and bequeath by this my last Will and Testament; I give and bequeath vnto my sonnes Mr Constant Southworth Captaine William Bradford to be equally deuided amongst them in equal and alike proportions. In Witness that this is my last Will and Testament I the said Alice Bradford haue heervnto sett my hand and seale; this twenty ninth day of December Anno: Dom. one Thousand six hundred sixty nine.

As Constant and Thomas Southworth were both members of the government, deputies and assistants, and held other positions of trust, it may be well, before giving a sketch of their lives, to review very briefly the political development of the colony.

In Holland the Pilgrims were, of course, under the authority of the Dutch, but Mr. Robinson, the pastor of the church, exercised a great influence over them. When they left Holland they came under the control of English law; they still felt Mr. Robinson's influence, and among the Leyden Pilgrims there was a unanimity of purpose and feeling which would influence them strongly for peace and good conduct. In England, however, a few joined their company who had not these associations, nor the same principles; it would have been wiser to have had some form of government to which appeal could be made if necessary. A governor was appointed for each vessel. Christopher Martin was governor of the "Mayflower" and Robert Cushman was his assistant.

This very slight control was all that was needed until they anchored in Provincetown harbor. There certain restless members of the company began to show signs of a spirit of insubordination, which if allowed to ripen would be sure to destroy the peace and probably the existence of the colony. Therefore a compact was drawn up and signed, which for years was the only constitution under which they lived. They had no charter, no written form from the king and his ministers, such as was the foundation of government in other colonies. Their agreement with the Adventurers was a heavy weight upon them and did not give them political powers.

Bradford says: "I shall a little returne backe and begine with a combination made by them before they came ashore, being ye first foundation of their governmente in this place; occasioned partly by ye discontented & mutinous speeches that some of the strangers amongst them had let fall from them in ye ship —— That when they came a shore they would use their owne libertie; for none had power to command them, the patente they had being for Virginia, and not for Newengland, which belonged to an other Govenment, with which ye Virginia company had nothing to doe. And partly that shuche an acte by them done (this their condition considered) might be as firme as any patent, and in some respects more sure.

"The forme was as followeth.

"In ye name of God, Amen. We whose names are underwriten, the loyall subjects of our dread soveraigne Lord, King James, by ye grace of God, of Great Britain, France, & Ireland king, defender of ye faith, &c., haveing undertaken, for ye glorie of God, and advancemente of ye Christian faith, and honour of our king & countrie, a voyage to plant ye first colonie in ye northerne parts of Virginia, doe by these presents solemnly & mutually in ye presence of God, and one of another, covenant & combine our selves together into a civill body politick, for our better ordering & preservation & furtherance of ye ends aforesaid; and by vertue hearof to enacte, constitute, and frame such just & equal lawes, ordinances, acts, constitutions, & offices, from time to time, as shall be thought most meete & convenient for ye generall good of ye Colonie, unto which we promise all due submission and obedience. In witnes whereof we have hereunder subscribed our names at Cap-Codd ye 11. of November, in ye year of ye raigne of our soveraigne lord, King James, of England, France, & Ireland ye eighteenth, and of Scotland ye fiftie fourth. Anoy Dom. 1620.' "

It is unnecessary here to dwell upon the simplicity, comprehensiveness, and independence of this document. "This is the first written constitution the world ever saw, and is the sole invention of the Pilgrims. It established principles which were then new and untried."

From time to time they enacted such laws as were needed, and instituted such offices as were clearly required. Immediately after subscribing to this covenant John Carver was chosen governor. When he died William Bradford was chosen in his place, and on account of his illness Isaac Allerton was chosen his assistant, that being the second office instituted.

As Bradford says, "Later they mette and consulted of laws and orders both for their civill and military Government, as ye necessitie of their condition did require, still adding thereunto as urgent occasion did require."

Allerton was reëlected assistant each year until in 1624, Governor Bradford requested that four others might be added; the governor was given a double vote. Later the number of assistants was

increased to seven.

At first the whole company met for the transaction of business, the enactment of laws, the passing of such orders as were necessary. We have no record of the frequency of these meetings. While the people lived together in Plymouth, few in number, this was practicable: but as the population increased and scattered it became less easy for all to meet in general assembly; most of the labor and responsibility of the government rested upon the governor and his assistants. They were the judiciary, the executive, and, in a measure, the legislative branches combined. They or any one of them administered oaths. Land was conveyed in most cases by the grantor acknowledging the sale before one of the magistrates, who made record of the fact. Wills were presented for probate to one of them. It should be remembered that the Pilgrims were, and considered themselves, subjects of the King of England, and subject to English law. It was, therefore, natural that trial by jury should be firmly established at the very earliest period, and that no special mention of its establishment should be found among the records of the colony. In a few cases, as in regard to Lyford, Governor Bradford does not mention a jury trial. The account of Lyford's trial seems to imply that the whole colony were present and took part. It was an unusual case, not an ordinary crime.

At length the population became too large for all to meet, and June 4, 1639, deputies from the different towns met as the first general assembly. I have found no order directing the election of these deputies, nor law organizing the assembly. This seemed to be the outgrowth of the necessity of the situation and the result of their being Englishmen, with a parliament in the home country. The deputies with the assistants formed the General Court.

In 1640 town meetings were first held in Plymouth in the meeting house, and selectmen were first chosen, seven in number, five being a quorum.

Perhaps the increase of the number of assistants was due to the increase in the task of governing the colony caused by the number of strangers who came over. It is at least a curious coincidence that in 1624 Lyford gave much trouble. It was that year Bradford

asked for the increase of assistants to four. Lyford was sent over by the Adventurers to act as minister. He tried to stir up strife, wrote letters to England full of slander and false accusations, tending to break up the colony and destroy it. When it was thought time to call him and Oldham, his confederate, to account, "The Governor called a courte and summond the whole company to appear." After this trial and conviction the court sentenced them to be expelled the place. The citizens generally attended the trial, but the court, that is, the governor and his assistants, seem to have conducted the trial and passed sentence.

Among minor offices which were instituted in the towns were surveyor of highways, constable, selectman, in which capacities the brothers Southworth served. They also served on the Grand Inquest and on the jury. Thomas served on a coroner's, jury more than once. All these offices were known to the English law.

Public schools are not mentioned in the records of Plymouth until 1663; then the General Court advised the towns to set up a school-master to teach the children reading and writing. In 1677 public grammar schools were required in towns having twelve families. Before these dates the children received private instruction from friends or others.

In the winter of 1626 and summer of 1627 the agreement with the Adventurers was canceled, the Adventurers and Isaac Allerton coming to an agreement which was ratified by the colony, the latter paying £1,800 in annual payments of £200 each.

Any opinion formed in regard to the influences which molded the character of the Southworth boys, which did not consider the religious beliefs and habits of the community would be very imperfect.

The Pilgrim movement from its inception throughout the sojourn in Holland and during the settlement at New Plymouth was essentially a religious movement, a protest against the state of morals in England and in the English Church at that time. During their earliest years at Leyden, Constant and Thomas Southworth were members of the small band of citizens who had left England and all they held dear that they might be freed from the state religion, might worship God according to their belief of truth without the interference of bishop or clergy. They were under the same influence while their mother was at Plymouth and they in England, and after coming here were still more fully subject to it.

To the Pilgrim the Bible was the word of God, which must have unquestioned obedience. Their laws, their lives, were formed upon the precepts of that book. Because they believed it to be the word of God and guided their lives by it, they did not hesitate to record

that various members of their community were guilty of offences which now are too little noticed. We read that so and so was fined or otherwise punished for drunkenness, for adultery, for fornication, for lying, for slander. Their effort was to keep the whole body of the people as pure and righteous as possible, ordering their lives by the Word. In their correspondence, even upon business matters, they showed the strong hold which their religious principles had upon them. References to God, to his providence, to Christ, commending one another to God's protection, were common in letters upon various subjects. Very common, of course, in many friendly letters, but also frequent in letters not specially to friends.

Justice, righteousness, integrity, were expected of every one. Lapses from uprightness were not passed unnoticed, but each received its due punishment; yet the Pilgrims were merciful, and often the offender was reprieved or the penalty delayed in execution that the guilty party might learn to do better and so escape.

The Pilgrims at Plymouth considered Mr. John Robinson their pastor until his death, and looked for his coming to them. They had no minister during the earlier years because he was their minister. Elder Brewster supplied the religious instruction to the community.

As the settlers increased and separated, each town was expected to provide for public worship. At length, there being few ministers, the people began to neglect public worship and did not provide for the support of the ministry. Then the General Court passed laws requiring the towns to perform that neglected duty. Church membership was never a requisite for admission as freeman, nor for the enjoyment of the franchise. With the neglect of public worship the towns became careless as to who was allowed to vote, and many voted who were not freemen. In 1671 the court voted that none be admitted freemen but such as are twenty-one years of age at least, and have the testimony of their neighbors that they are sober and peaceable in conversation, orthodox in the fundamentals of religion, and such as have also twenty pounds ratable estate in the government. This is the nearest they ever came to establishing a religious qualification for freemen.

During the whole early life of the community the Bible was their guide, the Christian religion was recognized as a necessity for a state; their particular form of church government was enforced in every way except by legal requirement; the lives of the great majority conformed to their professions and their principles.

The following account of the sabbath services at Plymouth in 1632 or 1633, as given by Governor Winthrop, who visited that colony, is of interest.

"On the Lords day there was a sacrament, which they did partakin: and in the afternoon Mr. Roger Williams (according to thei custom) Propounded a question, to which the pastor, Mr. Smith, spoke briefly; then Mr. Williams prophesied; and after, the governor of Plymouth spoke to the question; after him the elder; then some two or three more of the congregation. Then the elder desired the Governor of Massachusetts and Mr. Wilson to speak to it, which they did. When this was ended the deacon, Mr. Fuller, put the congregation in mind of their duty of contribution; whereupon the governor and all the rest went down to the deacon's seat, and put into the box, and then returned."

One of the most prominent and most troublesome questions which arose in the colony during the political activity of the Southworth brothers had to do with the Quakers. This new sect arose in England about 1650. In England and in Massachusetts Bay Colony the Quakers were denunciated, expelled the country and imprisoned; some were executed.

In considering this difficult question we must keep in mind that we cannot judge what the Quakers then were by what they now are; expressions and quotations from the Bible were used by the Quakers in such relations and conditions as to be easily misunderstood by their opponents. George Fox's followers adopted his principles and carried them to extremes in their practice. The liberty claimed by Fox and other leaders became license and indecorum as exercised by his followers.

It is not necessary to record here the treatment the Quakers received in other communities than in Plymouth Colony. The Pilgrims were undoubtedly influenced by reports received from England and elsewhere and were ready to prevent disturbance and disorder from such a source as soon as they appeared. The Quaker episode is included between 1656 and 1661. There were Quakers before and after those years, but the court was not called upon to notice them.

The punishment meeted to them ranged from expulsion the colony for strangers, fine, imprisonment, whipping, to disfranchisement; none were executed.

Disrespect to the magistrate, speaking contemptuously of the word of God or of the ministry, blasphemy, disturbance of religious meetings, were punished before the advent of the Quakers and have been since.

The offences of which the Quakers were guilty were chiefly the above. After having had some experience with them in this regard, it was thought best to prevent further trouble by not allowing them to come into the colony, by suppressing their meetings and restraining their license.

A few quotations from the records will give an illustration of the nature of the offences committed.

"Jane wife of William Launder of Sandwidge and Sarah, the daughter of Richard Kerby for disturbance by them made in the Publicke worship of God on the Lord's day att Sandwidge, by opposing and abusing the speaker amongst them" were summoned to Court March 5, 1656–1657.

This was not Sarah's first offence, and so sentence formerly passed upon her to be publicly whipped, was carried out; Jane was "centanced to be publickly whipt, onely the execution thereof is respeted that in case she shall be warned by the present centance and admonition to offend noe more in this kind — that then the said punishment not to bee inflicted, or otherwise to be executed." Do the laws now countenance the disturbance of public worship?

Nicholas Vpsiall, and Richard Kerbey, and the wife of John Newland and others met at the house of William Allin, at Sandwich on the Lord's day and at other times, at which meetings they "Vsed to invey against ministers and magestrates to the dishonor of God and contempt of government." Feb. 3, 1656.

"Zoeth Howland said the ministers taught lyes and that the Diuil could teach as good sermons as the ministers." Dec. 22, 1657.

While Humphrey Norton and John Rouse, Quakers, were being examined in court, Norton said "Vnto the Governor sudry times Thow lyest; and said vnto him, Thomas, thow art a malicious mann; in like manner the said John Rouse behaued himself in his words vnto the Court vnworthyly."

Again, Norton said to the governor, "Thy clamorous tongue I regard noe more than the dust vnder my feet; and thow art like a scolding woman: and thow pratest and deridest mee." They were sentenced to be whipped and pay the marshal's fee June 1, 1658.

It must be remembered that on this occasion the governor was sitting as judge of the court. What would a judge of the Superior Court of Massachusetts to-day do if an accused party should address him in such language?

Many who were brought before the court were cleared as not being "so guilty as was supposed."

Another offence of the Quakers was refusal to take the oath of allegiance to the colony and to the sovereign of England. The Pilgrims and others of that day did not understand that one might have conscientious scruples against taking a legal oath, and there was no provision in the law for affirmation. Enemies, Indians, Dutch at New Netherlands, and unfriendly colonists were around them; they had trouble with some who had settled near them.

Those who refused to take the oath of allegiance were fined or expelled the country, whether or not they were Quakers.

The laws were enforced with much leniency, as in the case of Jane Launder, mentioned above. It is not necessary to multiply instances.

Besides these offences, which may have deserved punishment, there were others which might have been passed by with silent contempt; others are recorded at which we may smile on account of their puerile nature, and the insight they give us into the childish side of the character of the Pilgrims makes them interesting. Yet the Pilgrims were not offenders in these respects more than many others have been, and perhaps even now there may be similar cases of magnifying trifles.

"John Copeland was sentenced to be whipt if found in the government. He had been found guilty of speaking falsely concerning Mr. John alden as that his head and knees trembled att such time as Copeland Christopher Holder were before him the said Alden and Lieutenant Southworth." Feb. 2, 1657–58.

Constant and Thomas Southworth were both interested in these questions about the Quakers, as both were in the legislature, Constant as deputy, Thomas as assistant, and both undoubtedly took part in the discussions regarding all important questions. It would be interesting if the speeches made at the meetings of the court had been preserved, but only the conclusions have come down to us.

Constant Southworth, when directed to deal with the Quakers and persuade them, was given, perhaps, a harder task than even the bringing of the old Welsh woman, goodwife Thomas, into order. With William Padobie he was directed "to repaire to such their [Quaker] meetings together with the marshall or Constable of the townes and to use theire best endeavor by argument and discourse to convince or hinder them."

We may conclude from all the records of Plymouth Colony that the Quakers violated well-known laws existing before their advent, that when expelled they persistently returned. They were not satisfied with holding meetings by themselves, they interrupted the worship of others and violated all rules of good deportment and reasonable behavior, such as even now is required by law; they were intemperate in the use of language to judges and magistrates, insulting those in power and authority. Though repeatedly admonished they courted punishment and received it.

The Pilgrims were much more lenient in their treatment of the Quakers than the government in England or in Massachusetts Bay. It is possible that if no notice had been taken of them, no harm would

have come to the colony, but the officials did not so think; and to-day if any one did the same he would receive punishment such as the law now provides, or be sent to an insane asylum.

Constant and Thomas Southworth, the two children of Edward and Alice Southworth, were born in Leyden. They must have had the advantages of the Dutch life, perhaps schools, until their father moved to England in 1620, when his friends came to Plymouth. After that he soon died and they probably were with their mother and later their aunt in England until 1628 when they, thirteen and twelve years old, came to Plymouth.

Our first thought of these two brothers in this country must, then, be of two sturdy boys of thirteen and twelve, playing on the sands of Plymouth harbor, roaming the fields and woods, fishing in the waters, doing such chores at home as suited their strength. Later they would take their part in the work in the field; an afternoon or a day occasionally given to the hunt. They joined with youthful zest in the sports and amusements of the young people in summer twilight's glow, or before the bright winter's fire of logs; boys among the boys, young men with the young men and maidens. With this life was combined their education in letters and in the affairs of that primitive life. There were no schools at that early period. They must have gained their first knowledge of letters in Holland or England, and doubtless their mother continued their training, and we can imagine the worthy governor occasionally aiding in instruction which may have required a deeper learning than that of his wife.

Little need be said of the training in righteousness and godliness. That was the necessary result of living in such an household. The Bible was the book of the home and they knew its precepts and followed its counsels all their lives.

Where so many rendered faithful and acceptable service to the colony, gave time and strength and means for the good and welfare of all, there need be no thought of underestimating the devotion of others or the value of their services, if I dwell now more particularly upon what Constant and Thomas Southworth did for the government, and the positions of trust to which they were called. We are considering their lives and so speak of their work, well knowing that others were also faithful. The amount of responsibility placed upon these two shows the confidence their fellow citizens had in their honesty, integrity, justice, fairmindedness, in their freedom from partiality or favoritism.

Constant was admitted as freeman of the colony in 1636-37,

Thomas in 1642-43. Thenceforth they took their share in the duties of free citizens of New Plymouth.*

In 1637 Constant Southworth volunteered to go "against the Peguin Indians in Reveng of the innocent blood of the English the said Peguins have barbarously shed to join with those sent by Massachusetts Bay and Connecticut."

In 1646 he was appointed ensign bearer for Duxbury Company, and this was his highest military honor.

The council of war, to which both brothers were elected, was chosen in 1653, "because that in regard of many dangers toward the country by enemies and the great necessities of counsell and advice in that respect the Court thought it meet to make choise of a counsell of war." Nine were chosen. "These nine or any of them beeing orderly called together their act is to be accounted in force, and they to be continued in their place until the next June Court coming twelve month. The Committee of war shall have full power to issue out warrants to press such number of men in every town as by proportion the said town is to send forth; and also to issue forth warrants to the said towns for arms and provisions, and all things necessary for them, and what charges shall arise to be levied on each town proportionably as other public rates and to give commissions to any chiefs officer under their charges either in time of peace or war."

Beside the offices mentioned above, Constant Southworth held positions on committees and was delegated to duties as being treasurer or as member of the house of deputies. It would be tedious to enumerate all these duties. There were then no special courts of justice, no probate court, no judges. Every dispute which could not be settled by the town magistrate was brought directly to the governor

*Constant Southworth held the following offices under the Plymouth government: He was volunteer in the militia, 1637; surveyor of highway for Duxbury, 1640; ensign bearer of Duxborrow Co., 1646, 1653; constable for Duxborrow, 1645, 1657; allowed to sell wine in Duxborrow, 1648; member of the Council of War, 1658, 1667; had some of the duties of revenue officer, 1662; deputy for Duxborrow, 1653 to 1668; treasurer of the colony, 1659 to 1678; assistant, 1670 to 1678.

It has been stated by some that he was commissary general in the beginning of King Philip's War. There is no record of such a position being given him. That title was used by Benjamin Church in his Autobiography as descriptive of the treasurer's duties in providing for the little army, rather than of any office he actually filled. It must be remembered that Colonel Church wrote or rather dictated to his son the account of that war when he was seventy years old or more. In the time of Constant Southworth the highest officer in the militia was captain or possibly major. Colonel Church received this title of colonel from Massachusetts, not from Plymouth Colony.

Thomas Southworth held the following offices: Surveyor of highway for Plymouth, 1643; on the grand inquest, 1644; lieutenant, 1648; on coroner's inquest, 1652; assistant at Kennebeck, 1654, 1655; deputy for Plymouth, 1652 to 1654; on petit jury, 1655; commissioner to Rhode Island in regard to Hogg Island, 1659; on Council of War, 1653, 1658; assistant, 1657 to 1668; captain, from 1659; commissioner of the United Colonies, 1662 to 1667; one of two to confer with his "Majesties Commissioners," 1664.

and his assistants with the deputies, and the General Court itself decided or appointed committees to investigate the various businesses referred to it.

We find, then, that Constant Southworth was employed in purchasing land from the Indians, in laying out the boundaries between towns or between the estates of two citizens, in laying out roads, building bridges, prisons, enlarging the governor's house, providing for the entertainment of the governor and members of the court; settling disputes; quieting irritation and discontent; caring for the preservation of the peace; feeding the small army the colony sent against the Indians. He was called on to settle the debts of Edward Hall, who left the colony, leaving behind his many unpaid bills. He was supervisor of the will and estate of James and Mary Lendall, deceased; had to care for the interests of their children; he was also to have the care and tuition or the children, the eldest having chosen him for her guardian. This gives us an insight into his character, as that of one in whom children trusted.

In 1658 he, with Mr. Collyare and Mr. Alden, had a delicate and perhaps difficult task confided to him. They were "requested and appointed by the Court to take some speedy course to reduce Goodwife Thomas, a Welch woman, living at the North River, to live more orderly, so as she be not for the future indangered to come to misery and extremity as formerly she hath bine."

When Thomas Prence was governor, he did not live at Plymouth, therefore it was necessary to provide for his entertainment there and while on his journey thither, and during his return to Eastham. Constant Southworth was, as treasurer, deputed to make provision for "our honored governor," twenty pounds being appropriated for that purpose.

The deputies and assistants were also entertained. It would seem that the amount voted by the court for the "Magestrate's table" was insufficient to satisfy Constant Southworth's idea of what was proper and desirable, so he made up the deficiencies, for which and tor his trouble in providing therefore he was voted three pounds. Again next year he complained there was neglect of payment of what was due for the charge of the magistrates.

The Pilgrims ran into debt during their early years in this country. They were imposed upon by their agents, and finally found themselves several thousand pounds in debt; much of this was owed to Mr. James Sherley, who seemed one of their most faithful friends, but later showed himself less disinterested. In order to obtain the means of paying this, and to be able to gain in wealth and prosperity, they entered upon several mercantile ventures, of which it is not

necessary to say anything. One only interests us now, that at the Kennebeck River, which was one of their most extensive ventures. They undertook to establish a trading post on that river, where they might trade with the natives. Thomas Southworth was appointed assistant there two years. It proved unprofitable and troublesome, on account of the unlawful acts of those who tried to gain an advantage there and to rob the Plymouth Colony of her goods and rights; so it was voted:

"The several towns within this government having sent in their deputies and impowered them to act for the country in all matters relating to the trade at Kennebeck they making their appearance "Impr. it was agreed that any former agreements notwithstand-

ing it shall be lawful for the Gouvernor and his petitioners, things being as they are, to call home their estates and servants when they

shall see cause."

"It was by the said committee refered to the major [Winslow] Lft. Southworth Mr Constant Southworth and Cornett Standish and Mr Josias Winslow sens. or any three of them being present, either to sell or otherwise dispose of the said tract in the countreyes behalf."

We see from these and other records of services rendered that Constant Southworth was required to settle disputes, to manage and settle estates, to control and manage the finances of the colony, perhaps more difficult then than now for the whole state, on account of their poverty. He was called upon to attend to many varieties of business for his fellow citizens, from selling a province in Maine to building a prison or bridge, and even to striving to control an old Welsh woman, and the yet more difficult task, perhaps, of striving to influence the Quakers to an orderly and righteous life.

His various services were appreciated by his fellow citizens, at least in regard to certain public interests. March 5, 1657, it was voted, "Whereas the sum of six pounds & nine pence rest due upon the account of Constant Southworth for charges expended by him in mending the bridge at Joanes River and because he hath been at trouble and charges in staying for his pay and spending time and taking paines about the said bridge the Court doe allow him for the same the sum of ninteen Shillings and three pence to make up his due to be the sum of seven pounds, part whereof to be paid in three barrels of oyle."

The following letter gives an insight into the character and training and shows the education, the business capacity, and kindness of Constant.

A difficulty arose between the government and some of the coast towns as to the right to whales cast upon the beach; it was left for Constant Southworth to see that the orders of the court were carried out, Oct. 1, 1661.

"Loving Friends, Whereas the General Court was pleased to make some propositions to you respecting the drift fish or whales: and in case you should refuse their proffer, they impowered me, though unfit, to farm out what should belong to them on that account and seeing the time is expired, and it falls into my hands to dispose of, I do therefore, with the advice of the Court in answer to your remonstrance, say, that if you will duely and truly pay to the country for every whale that shall come one hogshead of oil at Boston, where I shall appoint, and that current and merchantable, without any charge or trouble to the country, I say for peace and quietness sake you shall have it for this present season, leaving you and the election Court to settle it so as it may be to satisfaction on both sides, and in case you accept not this tender, to send it within fourteen days after the date herof: and if I hear not from you, I shall take it for granted that you will accept it, and shall expect the accomplishment of the same.

"CONSTANT SOUTHWORTH."

As early as 1638, Connecticut suggested that the four colonies of Massachusetts Bay, Connecticut, New Haven, and Plymouth should unite for mutual protection. At first Massachusetts Bay would not consent to the proposal, but in 1643 all these colonies had come to realize the advantage of such a union, and the first United States of America were confederated together. The preamble to the articles of confederation gives their reasons for this step better than an abstract can:

"Articles of confederation between the plantations vnder the Gouvernment of the Massachusetts the Plantations vnder Gouvernment of New Plymouth the Plantacions vnder the Gouvernment of Connectecutt and the Gouvernment of New Haven with the Planta-

cions in combinacion therwith

"Whereas wee all came into these parts of America wth one and the same end & ayme namely to advance the Kingdome of or Lord Jesus Christ and to enjoy the liberties of the gospell in puritie wth peace. And whereas in or settleinge (by a wise providence of God) we are further dispersed vpon the Sea Coasts and Rivers than was at first intended, so that we cannot according to our desire wth convenience communicate in one Gouvernment and Jurisdiction; And whereas we liue encompassed wth people of severall Nations and strang languages wth hereafter may prove injurious to vs or our posteritie. And forasmuch as the Natiues haue formerly committed sondry insolences and outrages vpon severall Plantacions of the English and haue of late combined themselues against vs. And seeing by reason of those sad distractions in England wth they haue heard of and by wth they know we are hindered, from that humble

way of seeking advise, or reapeing fruits of protection what at other times we might well expecte. Wee therefore doe conceive it our bounden duty without delay to enter into a present consotiation amongst our selues, for mutual help and strength in all our future concernment: That as in Nation and religion so in other respects we bee & continue One according to the tenor and true meaning of the ensuing Articles: Wherefore it is fully agreed and concluded by and between the parties or Jurisdictions aboue named and they jointly and severally doe by these presents agree & conclude That they all bee and henceforth bee called by the name of the Vnited Colonies of New England."

Then follow eleven paragraphs setting forth in full the agreement of union for offence and defence, for preserving their liberties and propagating the truth of the Gospel, for mutual safety.

Each plantation was to have jurisdiction within its own boundaries for its local affairs and interests.

All charges of war were to be equally borne in proportion to their inhabitants, and if one was invaded by an enemy all were to unite in its defence.

There were to be two commissioners from each colony or plantation. Citizens of one were to have free pass to and through the others. Criminals and escaped servants were to be returned.

No war was to be entered upon without the consent of at least six commissioners, except in case of sudden emergency. If any colony did enter upon an unjust war it should defray all the expense thereof and the others were not required to give assistance.

The proportion of soldiers to be furnished by the several colonies in King Philip's War was: Massachusetts, 527; Plymouth, 158; Connecticut, 315.

About 1667 New Haven united with Connecticut, so does not appear in the later records of the commissioners.

Thomas Southworth was one of the commissioners chosen by Plymouth for the years 1659, 1660, 1661, 1664, 1667.

As treasurer, Constant Southworth had much to do with the Indians, buying land from them. The colony very properly passed a law that no private individual should purchase land of Indians on his own account. All such transactions must be carried on through committees appointed for that purpose, and the court records contain many votes relating to this subject.

From the beginning it was the purpose of the leading colonists to treat the Indians honorably and fairly, to make friends and allies of them, recognizing that they had rights which should be respected. In trade the Indians received an equivalent for everything the English bought, whether corn, beaver skins, or lands. The personal

rights of the Indians were held as sacred as their own, and offences against law and good order on the part of the whites were punished. It was a trial to Bradford that the colony at Wollaston was so lawless, and thereby trouble arose which threatened to become serious. Myles Standish was obliged for the safety of all to show the Indians on that occasion the strength of the English, and convince them that they were able to protect themselves. This trouble would never have occurred had all settlers been as considerate as the Pilgrims.

Massasoit, the chief sachem of the Wampanoags, was a friend of the English. At his death his eldest son, Alexander, succeeded him, but soon died, and then Philip became the ruling chief. Philip sold and mortgaged his land to the English; he saw them gradually gaining possession of extensive tracts and increasing in numbers; he realized that they would finally occupy the whole country and be too powerful to resist. He early developed an hostility against the whites, and rumors of his dissatisfaction reached the colony. Yet he submitted himself and his tribe to the English king and professed to receive him as his sovereign. It may well be doubted whether he fully understood the act. He would naturally give it an interpretation agreeable to the customs and relations of the Indian tribes, not according to the Englishman's ideas.

Constant Southworth, and more especially Thomas, were employed in an effort to effect a friendly settlement between Philip and the colonists. Thomas was one of a committee of two to visit and summon him to Plymouth to answer to the rumors in regard to his disaffection. He appeared several times, professed his friendship, and was allowed to return to his tribe. This was as early as 1667. In 1671 it was decided to call Philip to account for his continued hostile attitude, and to send letters to Massachusetts Bay and Rhode Island acquainting them with the condition of affairs. Mr. Thomas Hinkley and Mr. Constant Southworth, two "of our magistrates," were ordered to go to Rhode Island with the letter and also to explain "our present state of matters relating to the premises."

an Benjamin Church, son-in-law to Constant Southworth, carried

the news of the imminent outbreak of hostilities to Plymouth. A small company of settlers was raised to keep the Indians in submission. To this Benjamin Church joined himself. Against his advice and much to his dissatisfaction a council held to consider what should be done "adjourned themselves from Mounthope to Rehoboth where Mr. Treasurer Southworth, being weary of his charge of Commissary General (provisions being scarce and difficult to be obtained for the army, that now lay still to cover the people from nobody, while they builded a fort for nothing) retired, and the power and trouble of that post was left to Mr. Church."

The title "Commissary General" seems to have been used here as descriptive of the duties of the treasurer in providing for the troops, rather than as a title legally conferred on Constant Southworth, because he was to fill such an office.

This was the only active part Constant took in the war. As assistant he took part in the deliberations of the General Court, and aided in shaping the policy of the government until his death in 1679.

Thomas Southworth was not called upon for so varied services as his brother. On Feb. 5, 1665, he was elected selectman of Plymouth. He was early appointed a lieutenant in the militia, and later a captain. He was intrusted with duties concerning the Indians; he aided in settling boundaries, but less frequently than Constant. He seems to have had less talent for finances and for business than his brother, but to have had more of a legal turn of mind. The committee to draw up the revised laws of the province in 1657 were directed to ask Lieutenant Southworth for help if necessary. He also in 1660 was one of a committee to prosecute a case of slander against the government.

As assistant he was active in framing the laws and orders passed by the General Court. We have no means of knowing how prominent a part he took in the discussions; to which party he belonged when there was such a division among the legislators; nor which way he voted upon many puzzling questions of the day, as, in regard to the treatment of the Indians; the payment of the day; the relation of the colony to the other neighboring colonies aught treatment of the Quakers; the establishment of schools; the suppont of churches and the ministry; what penalties should be inflicted for crimes. We know he bore his share in all the burdens of the day arto was one of the most faithful and constant of the assistants in attenes ance at the meetings of the court, being rarely absent.

* William Collier was one of the merchants of London who aided the Pilgrims in coming to Plymouth, furnishing the money for their outfit. After the partnership between the Pilgrims and the Adventurers was terminated, he came over in 1633 in the "Mary and Jane" with one hundred and ninety-six passengers; with him came his four daughters: Sarah, who married Love Brewster; Rebecca, married Job Cole; Mary, married Thomas Prence; Elizabeth, married Constant Southworth. There is no mention of his wife, so she probably died before he came over. It has been said that he was not content to share the profit of the enterprise of the Pilgrims without also sharing their hardships. He at once took a prominent position in the young colony. He was made freeman in 1633; in 1634 he was one of the tax assessors, was himself rated at £2.05.00. He was on many committees, for assigning and laying out land, for building a meeting house, on highways, to revise the laws, and with his son-in-law, Constant Southworth, he had the task of looking after Goodwife Thomas, the Welsh woman. He served on the council of war more than once. He was assistant twenty-eight years and was one of the most regular in his attendance, being rarely absent. He was one of the commissioners at the first meeting of the United Colonies in 1643. In 1659, "on account of his age and much business on him," the court ordered the treasurer to procure him a servant and allowed £10 for that purpose. He died in 1670.

* John Reynor (Raynor, Reinor) was born on his ancestral estates at Gildersome, in the Parish of Batley, County York, England. He graduated in 1625 at Magdalen College, Cambridge. He married, first, —— Boyes; second, Frances Clark. Elizabeth was the child of his second wife.

Governor Bradford in his history of Plymouth Plantation thus speaks of Rev. John Raynor: "This year (1636) Mr. Smith layed down his place of ministerie partly by his own willingness, as, thinking it too heavy a burthen, and partly at the desire, and by ye perswasion, of others: and the church sought out for some other, having been often disappointed in their hops and desire heretofore. And it pleased the Lord to send them an able and a godly man, and of a meeke and humble spirite, sound in the truth, and every way unreprovable in his life and conversation; whom after some time of triall they chose for their teacher, the fruits of whose labours they enjoyed many years with much comforte, in peace and good agreement."

He remained with the church until 1654, when he resigned and went to Dover, N. H., to live, where he died in 1669. By his will, recorded at Exeter, N. H., we learn that when he died

His death is thus recorded in Plymouth County records:

"On the eight day of December, anno Dom. 1669, the honored Capt. Thomas Southworth changed this life for a better, being then about the age of fifty three years, who was a majestrate of this jurisdiction, and otherwise a good benefactor to both church and commonwealth, and that which is more than all hath bine named, hee was a very godly man and soe lived and died full of faith and comfort, being much lamented by all of all sorts, sects, and conditions of people within our jurisdiction of New Plymouth."

The records of the First Church at Plymouth give a more extended notice of his death:

"It pleased God heavily to afflict this chh & people by the Death of Capt. thomas Southworth, of whom Honourable mention is made in the foregoing Narrative, & that most deservedly: He was a great Pillar in this chh, & in the dayes of blessed Mr Reyner, after the death of Elder Brewster (whose Name is here very pretious & ever will be soe) when the chh had agitations about the choice of a Ruling Elder, this Mr Southworth was Judged by many of the chh a very sutable man for that place, yet it was wisely foresoon by Govr Bradford that the necessity of the Commonwealth would doubtlesse call for the improovment of his Talent in the Magistracy, & so it prooved, for immediately upon the death of that Honourable Govr. he was chosen a magistrate & soe continued to There were other Bretheren that did exercise their gifts for edification of the chh in the vacancy of the ministry, yet such was the desireablenesse & excelling of his Gifts & graces that for divers yeares together he was espetially singled out by the chh to carry on the publick worship, one part of the Sabbath, Elder Cushman ordinarily spending the fornenoone & Mr Southworth the afternoone; His Death was on December, 8: (about 53 yeares old) after 1 monthes sicknesse: His death was much lamented & is to this day

he was loved & feared & of such a conversation as commanded both. The chh kept a day of prayer for his life, Dec: 1: but his time was come to die."

EDWARD SOUTHWORTH³ [Constant², Edward¹], b. in Duxbury, Mass.; d. about 1727; m., 16 Nov., 1669, Mary Pabodie, b. 7 Aug., 1648, dau. of William² and Elizabeth (Alden) Pabodie.* He was a yeoman. In 1667 he appears on the treasurer's book as due by rates to the Colony £00.09.00. He served on "Corrowners jury" in 1673; was constable for Duxbury in 1677; in 1679 was one of a committee to lay out a highway; in 1686 was summoned to serve on the jury, but neglecting to appear, was fined 10s.; was deputy to the General Court for Duxbury in 1689 and 1691. Res. Duxbury, where his children were born.

* Samuel³ Weston, Elnathan², Edmund¹ Weston, who came to Boston in the "Elizabeth & Ann," settled in Duxbury in 1635. In the list of passengers his age is given as thirty years. Elnathan married Desire Standish, granddaughter of Myles Standish. (See n., p. 39.)

† Jonathan² was son of John¹ Alden and Priscilla Mullins. John Alden was not one of the Leyden Pilgrims, but joined the company at Southampton. His name is given by Nathaniel

Morton as seventh of those who signed the compact in Provincetown Harbor.

Governor Bradford says: "John Alden was hired for a cooper, at Southampton, where the ship Victuled: and being a hopfull young man, was much desired, but left to his owne liking to go or stay when he came here: but he stayed, and maryed here." Nothing is known with certainty as to his origin. He evidently took part early in the affairs of the Colony. In the first list of freemen, made in 1633, he is named as one of the "Cowncell." At this time he was rated at £1.04.00. In the list of freemen, 1637, he was called "gent." and this title was often given him afterwards.

He held many offices in the Colony, was assistant from 1635 to 1640, and from 1650 was one of the Committee of Duxborrow township, that is, was deputy for Duxborrow from 1641 to 1649; was one of the Council of war in 1646, 1653, 1658, 1667. In 1645, he was appointed with others, to prepare laws to correct certain abuses; in 1649 and 1655, he was on the committee to let the trade of the Kennebeck; in 1656, he was on the committee to audit the accounts of Myles Standish, who had been treasurer. In the years 1656, 1657, 1658, he was treasurer. He, with William Collier and Constant Southworth, were appointed to look after Goodwife Thomas, the Welsh woman.

In 1657, "Mr. John Alden & Leiftenant Southworth are requested and appointed by the Court to goe down to Yarmouth and Barnstable, and to sett those differences that are betwixt the Indians and them att rights according to their best abilities."

At the General Court, held 7 March, 1664, and 30 Oct., 1677, he was called "Deputy Governor," the Governor being absent. It is not stated whether he was elected by the Court for that special occasion, or whether the position was a permanent one, so that the General Court might have some one to preside over it.

"Because he was low in his estate and spent much time in the service of his country "£10 was voted him by the Court.

He was born about 1599, married Priscilla Mullins in 1621 or 1622. We know not how much truth there may be in the tradition, which Longfellow has so beautifully perpetuated and nade immortal. Whether true or not, there was a companionship, at least of duties, between the soldier and the magistrate; John Alden and Myles Standish were repeatedly directed to run

lines between estates, to settle boundaries and disputes about estates. So many times were they assigned to such duties it would be tedious to enumerate every instance.

We learn from Governor Bradford's account that after the unfortunate collision between John Howland and Hooking at the Kennebeck, when John Alden stopped at Massachusetts Colony on his way to Plymouth, he was arrested and imprisoned, although Massachusetts had no jurisdiction over the Kennebeck, and Alden had no connection with the affair, except that he was on board the vessel when it happened. He was afterwards released, Governor Dudley expressing regrets at the occurrence and acknowledging that the arrest was unwar-

† Georgel Soule came in the "Mayflower," was entered as manservant to Edward Winslow and counted as belonging to his family. In 1623, he received in his own right an acre of land as the others. French or Flemish origin. Philip¹ was freeman of Plymouth 1632; removed to Duxbury, then to Bridgewater, Dartmouth, Middleboro.

Elizabeth³ Standish was daughter of Alexander² and Sarah (Alden) Standish. Myles¹ Standish, who was born about 1585 or 1586. One would infer from his will that his great-grandfather had been unjustly deprived of his share of inheritance, that his boyhood had on that account been one of privation, or at least of trial, which otherwise need not have been. He is said to have been an officer in the English army in Holland, whereby he gained considerable experience in the art of war before he joined the Pilgrims at Leyden.

He was their military leader against the Indians and led them in their early exploring expeditions. A young man of about thirty-five, when they came from England, he was soon one of the chief councilors of the infant settlement. During the first winter of want, sickness, and death, he was one of the few who, not attacked by the terrible scourge, could render assistance to the others.

Governor Bradford says there were only seven sound persons in the company: "two of these 7 were Mr. William Brewster, ther Reverend Elder, & Myles Standish, ther Captain & military commander, unto whom my selfe, and many others, were much beholden in our low & sieke condition." Here Governor Bradford dropped the third person in his narrative, and paid his return of thanks and appreciation to Standish in the second person.

Myles Standish was assistant nineteen or twenty years, treasurer ten years or so, on the council of war three times, was made commander of the Plymouth forces. In 1653, he was deputy governor. He was employed at home in all manner of business for the Colonists, and was sent to England as their agent. We cannot wonder that the Colonists should again and again call him affectionately, "Our Captain." Cool, courageous, strong, tactful, just, wise, honest, experienced, tender, thoughtful, a good judge of men and their character, with strong will and firm purpose, probably with quick temper, under control, Myles Standish was just the kind of leader needed to guide the Colony through the difficulties which surrounded them in their early years.


His birthplace is not known, nor much as to his early life. The ninth clause of his will gives a clew to his family. In it, he states that he was of the House of Standish of Standish. "I give unto my son & heir aparent Alexander Standish all my land as heir aparent by lawful decent in Ormistick, Borsonge, Wrightington, Maudsley, Newburrow, Craston and the He of Man and given to me as right heir by lawful decent, but surreptitiously detained from me, my great grandfather being a second or younger brother from the House of Standish of Standish."

In "Charters and Deeds relative to the Standish Family of Standish and Duxbury, Co. Lancaster," edited by Earwaker, are given abstracts of a large number of documents relative to the Standish family.

The first document bears date 1222 and is called: "Fine sur cognizance de droit." Thurstan de Standish seeks to recover land in Lancashire as son and heir of his mother Margery, daughter of Henry de Hulton. His wife's name was also Margery.

Then there are charters which show a Ralph de Standish had a son Jordan de Standish. The relation of Ralph to Thurstan de Standish is not shown.

In 1273, William, son of Jordan de Standish, was witness to a charter and was called "Lord of Standish." William's name is found until 1318-19.



The name of John de Standish, son of William, Lord of Standenische, occurs from 1329 to 1348. To one of the grants made by this John de Standish is attached a seal, having the Standish arms—a saltire between four crosses patence: legend "St. Johannis de Standish." Of course the colors are not given. This coat of arms differs from that of Ralph de Standish (1400) and from the later arms usually known as the Standish arms.

In 1339 the name of Gilbert de Southworth is signed as witness to a deed given by Adam de Tyldeslegh to John de Standish.

John's children were Henry, William (1332), Edmund (1332), Ralph (1332), and perhaps Gilbert (1382). The descendants of Ralph can be

followed for several generations.

Henry de Standish, Lord of Standish, eldest son of John, is named in deeds and charters from 1318 to 1393. Of Henry's children only the name of

Ralph de Standish is found. He died before 1403-04. His children were: Lawrence, George (1400, 1407), John (1410), Gilbert (1400), and probably Alexander (1398, 1405), who was pastor of the church of Standish. Ralph's arms, as shown in a seal appended to

There is probably some mistake about his second wife. His son John is not mentioned in his will. There is no mention of the birth

one of the documents was — saltire for Standish, the bordure engrailed: Legend, "Sigil Radulphi de Standish."

Lawrence de Standish was eldest son and heir of Ralph. In 1399, by fine, Ralph de Standish and Cecelia, his wife, settled on Lawrence de Standish and Lora, his wife, lands in Shevington. Lawrence was living in 1431. His son and heir was

Alexander de Standish, died before 1445-1446: married 1421-22, Constance Gerard, daughter of John Gerard of Bryn; had a large family of sons, Ralph, Lawrence, Oliver, Hugh,

Robert, Piers. His eldest son and heir,

Ralph de Standish, died before 1473-74, had three sons, Alexander, Thomas, Brian.

Alexander (1451-52), later Sir Alexander de Standish, Knt., was followed by his son and heir, Ralph Standish de Standish. This is the first time this combined name "Standish de Standish" appears in any documents (1485-1538). In 1520, Ralph Standish received land in Duxbury called Alddall, and land in Wrightington; in 1524, from Thomas Duxbury, he received Duxbury Hall. The children of this Ralph were Alexander, Roger, George, and a daughter, Anna, who married, 1518-19, John Holcroft.

Alexander Standish de Standish is first mentioned in 1513, died 1542-44. He was followed

by his son,

Ralph Standish of Standish, who died young, before 1547. He was followed by his brother, Edward Standish of Standish, son of Alexander. Edward was a minor at the death of Ralph. His children were Alexander, his eldest son and heir; Edward, third son; and Thomas, fourth son. The name of his second son does not appear.

Alexander, son and heir of Edward, married, 1575, Elizabeth Harwarden, daughter of Adam Harwarden of Wolston, which came into the Standish family through this marriage. About this time the new mansion house was built, called the "Hall of Standish." Alexander had

Ralph, Thomas, Roger, John.

Ralph Standish of Standish had a son Edward, who, 1632, married Elizabeth Howard.

Myles Standish believed that a wrong had been done his great-grandfather. Several of the documents refer to certain legal transactions, which show that land in several villages, in Standish and Duxbury, Longtree and Worthington among others, were involved. The papers are not sufficiently explicit to enable us, with our ignorance of the localities, to understand exactly what was done, nor to judge of the justice of the transactions. During his lifetime, Lawrence de Standish, father of Alexander de Standish, had enfeoffed to James de Standish of Erley and others, the right and title to the manor of Standish, and advowson of the church, etc. These were released to Roger de Standish, parson of Standish, and other trustees in 1454–56. This James Standish's connection with the family does not appear from the records. In 1512–13, Ralph Standish conveys the manor of Standish, with advowson of the church, to Matthew Standish and James Standish of Erley, and others in trust.

March 4, 1513, is a recovery roll, an old English method of transferring land, or confirming title to land. Fines and recoveries were abolished in 1833. Alexander Osbaldston, James Smithley and others against James Standish of Erley, Roger Braidshaigh of Haigh and Matthew Standish of lands in Blackrad, Chorley and Duxbury, with the third part of two mills in Dux-

bury and Chorley.

March 24, 1513, is the confirmation deed to the recoverer, James Standish of Erley and Constance, his wife, and the heirs of that marriage; remainder over to George Standish, son of Ralph Standish, Esq., and his heirs male lawfully begotten; remainder to Roger, another son of Ralph, and his heir; remainder to Alexander, son and heir apparent of Ralph Standish and his heirs male; remainder to Ralph Standish and his heirs general forever.

In 1525, Alexander Standish, son and heir of Rauff, was made executor of the last will and

testament of James Standish of Erley. The will is not given.

According to the confirmation deed, Ralph Standish of Standish (1485 to 1538), had only three sons, George, Roger and Alexander. As the "remainder over" was deeded last to the eldest son, it is probable that it was deeded first to the youngest son, which would show that George was the youngest. Then George was the "second brother." One of the two brothers, Roger or George, must have been the ancestor of Myles, and it seems from the wording of Myles' will that the second, or younger, brother of Alexander Standish was he to whom Myles refers as not receiving the estate which rightfully belonged to him. According to the confirmation deed, the property should have passed to George Standish and his heirs male, if James Standish of Erley had no children. Here, then, is a possibility of such a miscarriage of the inheritance as Myles Standish refers to. Alexander, the eldest brother, son and heir of Ralph, was executor of James Standish's will. There would seem to have been an opportunity for Alexander to take illegal advantage of his younger brother in settling the estate of

of his children in the Duxbury records,* but the marriages of several are recorded.

JEDEDIAH SOUTHWORTH⁵ [Thomas⁴, Edward³, Constant², Edward¹], b. 13 April, 1702; d. 8 Sept., 1739; m., about 1728, Hannah Scales, dau. of William³ and Hannah Scales† of North Yarmouth, Me. He moved from Duxbury to North Yarmouth in 1730, and in 1735 returned to Duxbury. His name is ninth in the catalogue of the First Church in North Yarmouth, of which he was one of the original members and deacon. He and his father, Thomas Southworth, each received land in North Yarmouth, drawn by lot in 1727. His children's births are all recorded in Duxbury.

James Standish of Erley. He may have disregarded the confirmation deed. There is no information as to what became of the property. It did not descend to Myles.

The line to which Myles Standish belonged branched from the main line at his great-

The line to which Myles Standish belonged branched from the main line at his great-grandfather. Ralph Standish of Standish, mentioned above, would belong to the same generation as Myles of Plymouth, one born about 1576, or a little later, the other in 1585. The great-grandfather of Myles would belong, then, to the same generation as Alexander, who died 1542. He had two brothers, Roger and George. Ralph, the father of these three, was the first Standish who received the name Standish of Standish, 1485–1538.

Ralph Standish of Standish (1485-1538) was great-great-grandfather of Myles Standish.

Alexander, Roger, George (1513).

George, probably great-grandfather of Myles Standish.

DESCENDANTS OF NATHANIEL SOUTHWORTH

NATHANIEL SOUTHWORTH³ [Constant², Edward¹], b. in Plymouth, Mass., 1648; d. in Middleboro, Mass., 14 Jan., 1710-11; m., 10 Jan., 1671-72, Desire Gray, b. 6 Nov., 1651, d. in Plymouth, 4 Dec., 1690, dau. of Edward and Mary (Winslow) Gray.* He lived at first in Plymouth, later in Middleboro, Mass. In 1708 he is described in deeds as "of Plymouth, often residing in Middleboro"; in 1708 he is described definitely as "of Middleboro." He was surveyor of highways for Plymouth in 1673; constable for Plymouth, 1668; and two years later was fined 10s. for refusing to aid the constable in the execution of his office. He was selectman for Plymouth, 1689 and 1691; was ensign in 1694-95. He owned land in Tiverton, R. I. For many years the Southworth family owned large tracts of land in Middleboro, some of the richest and most valuable land in that town belonging to them.

* The ancestors of Edward Gray are not known. He came to Plymouth with his brother, Thomas, in 1643. According to tradition they were smuggled on board the ship in which they came and sent to America by relatives, who wished to get possession of their property in England. Edward Gray was constable for Plymouth in 1666, was freeman in 1670; deputy for Plymouth, 1676, 1677 to 1679. He was in court in several law suits, generally as plaintiff, often as defendant; he seems to have been of hasty temper, was fined 10s. for using reviling speeches to John Bryant on the Lord's Day as soon as they came out of the meeting. The record does not say what provocation thereto John Bryant gave.

The oldest gravestone on Burial Hill in Plymouth has this inscription: "Here lyeth yebody of Edward Gray, Gent aged about fifty-two years and departed this life ye last of June

1681."

Mary (Winslow) Gray was daughter of John and Mary (Chilton) Winslow. John Winslow was brother to Gov. Edward Winslow, came over in the "Fortune" in 1621; married, 12 Oct., 1624, Mary Chilton. They moved to Boston in 1657.

Mary Chilton was daughter of James and Susanna Chilton. They all came on the "May-flower." James died in Provincetown Harbor before landing; his wife Mary died soon after landing at Plymouth.

NATHANIEL SOUTHWORTH⁴ [Nathaniel³, Constant², Edward¹], b. in Plymouth, 18 May, 1684; d. 8 April, 1757; m., before 1710, Jael Howland, b. 13 Oct., 1688, d. 9 Nov., 1743, dau. of Isaac² and Elizabeth (Vaughn) Howland.* He is called lieutenant in Middleboro town records. He succeeded his brother Ichabod as

* Isaac² Howland was son of John¹ Howland and Elizabeth (Tilly) Howland. John was born about 1592, came in the "Mayflower," classed as man-servant in John Carver's family. He is supposed to have come from Lincolnshire, though the evidence of his parentage is not conclusive. He seems to have had two brothers, Henry and Arthur, in the colony, who were less law abiding than he and gave some countenance to the Quakers.

On the voyage over he had an exciting experience, which is related by Governor Bradford in his History of Plymouth Colony:

"In one of the storms encountered on the passage, as they thus lay at hull, in a mighty storme a lustic younge man (called John Howland) coming upon some occasion above ye Grattings, was, with a seele of ye shipe throwne into ye sea; but it pleased God yt he caught hould of ye tope-saile halliards, which hunge over board, rane out at length; yet he hald his hould (though he was sundries fadoms under water) till he was hald up by ye same rope to ye brim of ye waters, and then with a boat hooke & other means got into ye shippe againe, & his life saved; and though he was something ill with it, yet he lived many years after and became a profitable member both in church & commonwealth."

He was one of the party of ten which was sent ashore December 8, 1620, to explore the country and select a place for landing. He held several offices in the Colony, being assistant, 1633 to 1635. He was on the committee of townships for Plymouth in 1646, which seems to have been equivalent to deputy. He was deputy eleven years, between 1652 and 1676. He was one of a committee to meet commissioners of Massachusetts Bay to settle the boundary line between the two colonies. He was freeman of Plymouth in 1633, was taxed 18s., rated at corn 1s. per bushel, to be brought in at or before the last of November. In 1634, his taxes were £1.04,00.

While the Plymouth Colony held possession of the settlement at Kennebec River there was trouble with settlers on other parts of the Maine coast. In 1634, John Howland was the head of that settlement, and one Hocking, who was under the employ of the Colony at Piscataqua, caused a disturbance by trying to win away the trade with the Indians from the Kennebec settlers. Hocking had taken his vessel up the river so as to intercept any natives who might come down to trade. Howland warned him to desist and charged him to weigh anchor and depart. Hocking refused, using vile and insulting language. Howland sent three men in a canoe to cut his cable. Hocking presented his gun at the head of one, Talbot. Howland stood on his vessel and called on Hocking not to shoot the man, who was doing only what he ordered, but to shoot him, telling him he was a fair mark; if any wrong was done it

* Mrs. Bridget Southworth is recorded, married, 19 April, 1749, Capt. John Phillips, probably the record of her second marriage.

Zachariah Gurney. In Dedham Deeds he and his wife are called, in the deed, "Southard," but in signing the deed she signs "Southworth"; he does not sign. This may be the Benjamin Southword who appears among the list of men in Tenth Company, Plymouth County regiment, in the muster and pay rolls. It is stated that he sold his farm for Continental money. Not using it at once it became worthless and all he got for the whole amount was his supper, lodging, breakfast and his horse's keep. Perhaps it is not surprising that with this experience he was engaged in "Shays's Rebellion." He took the oath of allegiance in 1787 with others thus implicated, and delivered up his gun.

He is said to have been blind during the last three years of his life; but it is possible his widow's blindness may have been ascribed wrongly to him.

His widow lived with her son Jonathan at Fairfax, Vt. She was unfortunate in her late life and sought a pension, the following letter telling a sad tale. It is pleasant to know that she received the pension.

In 1617, he and John Carver were sent to London to negotiate with the Virginia Company for the emigration of the Pilgrims to Virginia. Nothing resulted from these negotiations. After some delay, in 1619, he was sent again to England with William Brewster and obtained a patent which was not used. Finally, in 1620, an agreement was drawn up between "the Adventurers" on one part and Cushman and Carver for the Pilgrims. This was ratified by the Pilgrims in Holland. But when the time came for the final settlement the Adventurers, or rather one, Thomas Weston, insisted upon changes in the agreement to which Cushman felt compelled to agree, because such progress had been made in preparation in Holland that if the enterprise had fallen through the Pilgrims would have lost nearly all they had. There was loud complaint against Cushman for consenting to these changes. He exceeded his authority, but seems to have done the best he could under the circumstances.

Cushman sailed from London to Southampton on the "Mayflower," and there met the "Speedwell." Christopher Martin was made governor of the "Mayflower" and Cushman his assistant. When the "Speedwell" was finally abandoned at Plymouth, Cushman was among those who remained ashore. The next year he came in the "Fortune" with many of those left behind, bringing his son, Robert, whom he left in Governor Bradford's family. The father returned to England in the "Fortune" as agent for the Colony and continued to act for them until his death. If he had been considered very blameworthy for the change in the conditions, it is not likely that he would have been retained as their agent.

The day before he sailed on his return to England he preached a sermon, "On the sin and danger of Self Love," the first sermon preached in America which was printed. Cushman wrote several letters which are still in existence; one to Edward Southworth has been given

In his last letter to Governor Bradford, in 1623, he commends his son, Robert, to his care: "Lastly I must intreat you still, to have a care of my son, as of your own, and I shall rest bound unto you. I pray you let him sometime practise writing. I hope the next ship to come to you." Bradford thus comments on this letter: "Thus were his last letters, and now we lost the help of a wise and faithful friend, he wrote of the sickness and probability of the death of another, but knew not that his own was so near: what cause have we therefore ever to be ready! He purposed to be with us the next ship, but the Lord did otherwise dispose."

He drove at once to the spot into the center of the brutal crowd, between the fighters themselves; and rising to his feet shouted, "In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts I command you to disperse." They dispersed.

Willard Barker said of him: "His disposition was ever kind and amiable; he loved a joke when not made at the expense of another's feelings; and his noble and generous heart won the love of those who knew him intimately." In his business career nothing marked him more conspicuously than his thorough integrity.

At his decease he was an officer in twelve corporations. He was especially kind and considerate to the poor and unfortunate.

It is uncertain how long William lived in Duxbury, where he was deputy, 1654-63 and 1671-82; selectman, 1672-75, 1683-85. He was in Little Compton in 1686. For a while he was at Bristol, R. I. All his children are entered on the records of the Church of Christ, at Bristol, as baptized 29 June, 1709. He was an extensive landed proprietor in Little Compton. He gave land to his sons Samuel, Thomas, Stephen, Benjamin, and Andrew; and to Gideon he gave his dwelling house, orchard, and land; yet at his death his property was inventoried at £2,500. With his wife, Martha, he gave Joseph and his wife, Mary Blaque, a dwelling house, orchard, and twentysix acres of upland adjoining the same with a saw mill standing upon the corn-mill stream with forty-two acres of upland on the west side of said stream and twenty acres of upland adjoining the lands of Reynolds Marvin, with ten acres meadow known by the name of the fresh meadow, and also a certain corn mill built upon the same stream with the above saw mill on the east side of the saw-mill dam. all which are situate, lying, and being in the township of Lyme, Ct. This was to be a part of Mary's portion of her father's, Joseph Blaque, estate

William Southworth was commissioned lieutenant, 1689, and was to receive 25s. per week for his services.

In the burying ground at Little Compton are the graves of William

By the death of his father the family was left poor, and his older brothers were placed where they could earn their living, he and his next older brother staying, however, with their mother. She taught him reading so early that he did not remember when he could not read. She also taught him to write, at which he became very expert.

[†] Experience Porter moved, about 1725, from Hadley, Mass., to Mansfield, Ct.

He ran a penknife into his hand, causing a wasting of the hand and incapacitating him for manual labor. For several years he was school teacher. After his marriage, 1754, he studied Latin. In 1756 he was first chosen town clerk. He was re-elected for fifty years in succession.

He learned surveying and was appointed surveyor for the county of Windham.

He was chosen deacon of the church about 1764; selectman in 1775; was appointed justice of the peace in 1775; in 1782, justice of the quorum; he was also inspector of saltpeter and powder at the powder mill in the county, 1776 to 1778; was member of the Assembly, which during the war frequently met. He was deputy to the General Court from 1770 to 1775, and, after the Independence of the United States, from 1776 to 1779.

Of the feeling of the country at the beginning of the Revolutionary War he says: "The Revolutionary War was now, 1775, seriously commenced. Revolutionary principles now spread and pervaded the Country, and Wig and Tory were appropriate names of the parties, but the Tories were much the smallest party, especially in the state of Connecticut."

He gives an account of the political activity during the Revolution; the frequent assemblies, town meetings, committee meetings, to guard the public safety, to counteract the machinations of the Tory party, to maintain public interest, to supply the means for carrying on the war, to equip and supply the army. "The selectmen of the several towns had this business to perform."

"In or about the month of June, 1778, your amiable and as I have reason to hope pious Eldest Brother on board a prison ship, in the harbour of New York, fell a victim to the relentless Execution of the mistaken and cruel policy of the then British Administration. To no office that I sustained was attached any considerable Emolument, to some none at all — but to that of Selectman was anxiety and even distress annexed: my situation being very central in the Town and those of my Brethren in office remote, and although they were Judicious and capable men, yet a recruit would not travel 4 or 5 miles to be furnished with a gun, a blanket, a knapsack, &c. I could scarcely proceed 10 rods on my own business to take care of a farm very near, which I had lately purchased, without being called back. . . . This naturally devolved on me the keeping of accounts . of all contracts and disbursements. This business was very trying to my slender constitution, especially as part of the time I was afflicted with a complaint in my head and at length it became a terror to me to see any man approaching my door, unless I had good

reason to believe that his business did in no way relate to the affairs of the War."

He says that in young life he greatly delighted with poetry. He was intensely fond of music.

These memoirs show their author to have been a modest, quiet, affable man, conciliating enemies and turning them into friends, naturally irritable, irascible, quick tempered, but obtaining complete control over himself; overcoming obstacles, a weak constitution, serious illness, imperfect advantages and, with little external help, training himself in mathematics, in writing, and gaining considerable literary ability and knowledge. By integrity and conscientious devotion to public good winning his way to the highest positions in the gift of his fellow townsmen; trusted as a man of sound judgment and sterling integrity in affairs of town and state.

He had an unfaltering faith and trust in God and an humble recognition that whatever was good in himself was due to divine favor and help. He was a man of strong will and untiring perseverance. In Constant Southworth we have an example of the men who have made this nation.

When he died his estate was inventoried at \$1,482.70. By his will he left everything to his wife, Mary; nothing to his children, as none of them lived less than one hundred and sixty miles distant from their mother, and she would need it all for her support.

He had made it with his own hands the year before, expressly for this journey. Imagine his chagrin and disappointment when the United States Government appropriated it to transport the gold and silver from New Haven to Hartford, out of harm's way. That was in the War of 1812, and the British were swarming around the shores of Long Island Sound. But the cart was finally recovered and did duty in carrying its share of the family across the country.

In those days the country traversed was a wild and desolate wilderness. All the hills and valleys were covered with dense forests. There were few roads, and at night bears and wolves furnished music to lull the traveler to sleep. There were five children, all under ten years of age. He settled and cleared for a home in Bridgewater, near Montrose, Pa. Now, between one hundred and one hundred and fifty descendants of Gideon Southworth are living in the vicinity of Lawsville, Pa. They have an annual reunion. This branch of the Southworth family is very musical, and they furnish their own brass band and other music for these reunions. These family meetings are held at the homes of different members of the association.

The price of land was so high, and he had so many boys, who wanted farms, he stayed there only two or three years, then moved farther west to Pickering, where he lived until, in 1846, he moved to Bosanget, Lambton Co., where he died.

GEORGE LE ROY BROWN¹⁰ [Helen Cornelia⁹ (Southworth) Brown, Mason D.⁸, James⁷, William⁶, William⁵, Nathaniel⁴, William³, Constant², Edward¹], b. in Jackson, Mich., 13 April, 1849; m., 19 Aug., 1875, Mary W. Hyde, b. 2 Feb., 1854, at Marshall, Mich., dau. of Hon. Augustus Osborn Hyde⁷.* Provost marshal, state of Michigan, during the Civil War, 1860–65. She graduated at high school, Marshall, Mich., thoroughly trained as a musician. He was student at Albion College, Albion, Mich.; was appointed cadet at West Point, where he graduated 1872, second lieutenant, Eleventh United States Infantry. He was in the field with General Mackenzie early part of 1873; post commissary of subsistence one year, 1873–74. From 1874 he served against the Indians; was personally

commended by his commanding officers, Colonel Wood and General Buell; acted as Indian agent and aided in establishing Indian training schools at Carlisle, Pa. Promoted to first lieutenant, 1882; served in varied capacities at military stations and as professor of military science and tactics at Delaware College and the University of Tennessee and as instructor of state militia. Promoted to captain, 1890; quelled an Indian outbreak, for which he was commended by his commanding officers and by the Secretary of the Interior. Served as colonel of Fourth Tennessee Volunteers during Spanish War; was military governor of Trinidad, Cuba; later stationed at Matanzas, Cuba. Promoted to lieutenant colonel, 1901; proceeded to Philippines; governor of province of Paragua, etc.; later in command of his regiment, the Fourteenth United States Infantry.

CHAPTER V

SOUTHWORTHS IN ENGLAND

SOUTHWORTH ARMS

[The numbers enclosed in brackets refer to the works mentioned in the bibliography at close of chapter.]

The Southworth arms are described differently by different authors, and the representations of them in stained glass or tapestry are not the same as the oldest descriptions. According to some accounts the shield was made up quarterly,—1 and 4 of Southworth arms, 2 and 3 of Dewyas arms. The colors, or, to use the heraldic term, the tinctures, being reversed in these two families. This would refer the conferring of the arms in the two families to the same period, or possibly Sir Gilbert de Southworth, who married Cecelia Dewyas, procured arms for his wife's family and for himself at the same time, or adopted for his arms the same device as Samlesbury arms with colors reversed.

cretical attendenties

The following are the descriptions of the arms given by different authors. It seems as if the arms represented in the Samlesbury Chapel in the shield which with crested helmet and sword was attached to the north wall of the chancel, as shown in the photograph, may be considered the correct arrangement; and this agrees with the description given by Joseph Edmonston in "A Complete Body of Heraldry," 1780, Volume I, page 107. This contains Glover's Ordinary of Arms (1250) augmented and improved. The Southworth arms are thus given:

Sa., a chev. betw. three cross-crosslets ar.; crest, a bull's head erased ar. This Sir Gilbert de Southworth bore arms in 1321 as described above. The date of his marriage is not known, and may have been yet earlier [42, page 301].

The arms in the above-mentioned shield are arranged quarterly, 1 & 4 as above, with 2 & 3 of reverse color: Ar., a chev. betw. three cross-crosslets sa., which was probably the Dewyas arms. The arrangement in Wells Cathedral window is just the reverse in color; but it did not belong to the main or original line of eldest sons, but to a branch derived from a second son, and this in one description is indicated by a crescent for difference.

Joseph Edmonston in his second volume gives other Southworth arms: Somersetshire and Sandbury in Lancashire have, ar., chev. betw. three cross-crosslets sa.; crest, a bull's head erased sa., the horns or tips of the first; on the neck a crescent for difference. The crescent was used to differentiate the second son from the eldest and heir of the house.

Southworth in Lancashire (not of Samlesbury), gu., a chev. betw. three cross-crosslets ar. Another is, ar., a chev. betw. three cross-crosslets gu.; crest, a bull's head erased sa. attired ar.

Southworth in Ireland had, sa., a chev. ar. in chief, two cross-crosslets of the second, in base a helmet proper; crest, out of a ducal coronet ar., a bull's head sa.

The bearing of arms in their present form is referred to the time subsequent to the first crusade, when, the knights' faces being covered by the visor of their helmets, it became necessary that they should be able to quickly recognize one another. Hence an arrangement was adopted of various devices borne on surcoat and banner, and, later, on shield, by means of which each one could be recognized. The custom of bearing arms grew gradually and was regulated by certain laws during the twelfth and thirteenth centuries, was most important in the fourteenth and fifteenth, and after the sixteenth century became matter of social distinction and family pride.

The cross was the most honorable charge to be found in heraldry, and its bearing is said to be the badge of the Christian. "All crosses signify unto us tribulation and affliction." "Every form of cross had a direct reference to the Church and its risen Head." "The number three was of frequent occurrence and was in memory of the Trinity. The chevron signified protection and has often been granted in arms as a reward to one who has achieved some notable enterprise. It is supposed to represent the roof-tree of a house, and sometimes has been given to those who have built churches or fortresses, or have accomplished some work of faithful service. The cross-crosslet being crossed at each of the four points is said to signify 'the fourfold mystery of the Cross.'"

In the cathedral at Wells, Somersetshire, England [46], the arms of the Wells branch of the Southworths appear in a window. During the Reformation some damage was done the ancient structure. From 1848 to 1854 the "restoration" of the choir destroyed much that was of interest. Now, in the south aisle of the choir there is good glass in all the upper lights. The third window has later glass in the lower lights. Here are many coats of arms and a series of small square pictures of foreign type. One of the arms is that of Henry Southworth of Wyke Champflower. It is thus described:

Quarterly, 1 & 4 arg., a chev. betw. three cross-crosslets sa., Southworth; 2 & 3 sa., a chev. betw. three cross-crosslets arg. Dayas; imp. gu., a band regulee betw. two cross-crosslets, Pellsant. Under the shield is the date 1607. In another pane of the window is a coat of arms. Quarterly, 1 & 4 same as above for Southworth, 2 & 3 for Dayas; imp. quarterly, 1 & 4, arms of Lloyd, 2 of Enion Efell, Lord of Cymelerth, 3 of Keffin. Date 1607. This is the arms of Edward Southworth, father of Henry, who married Jane Lloyd.

On the monument of Henry Bull, of Shapwick Church, are the arms of Henry Bull. William Bull married Jane, daughter of Henry Southworth of Wells. The arms are quartered, 1 & 6 the arms of Bull, 2 of Southworth, 3 of Dayas, 4 quarterly of Dutton (Christopher, great-grandfather of Henry Southworth, married Isabel Dutton, daughter and coheir of Sir Thomas Dutton, of Dutton), 5 of Pellsant.

Henry Southworth was buried near his wife at Wyke Champflower, a chapelry in the parish of Bruton, of date, 1623, built on to the old manor house of which manor he was lord. On the south side of the chancel is a mural monument to his memory on which are four shields of arms, first Southworth and Dyas quarterly.

To William Bull, who married Jane Southworth, was confirmed by Sir William Segar Knight, alias Garter Principall King of Arms, a coat Quarterly of Twelve of which 3 was arg., a chev. betw. three cross-crosslets sa., Southworth; 4, sa., a chev. betw. three cross-crosslets arg., Dayas.

At Bramhall Hall in Cheshire is a room called the "Plaster Room" from the floor being of that material. Formerly many objects of interest were hung around this room. On one side was a piece of ancient tapestry on which were worked over thirty shields of arms, displaying the alliances of the Davenport family, with the arms of some of their neighbors and friends. This tapestry was seventeen feet long and seven feet wide, covered with a flower pattern on a blue ground. The shields of arms were worked in their proper colors around the edges, and in the center three shields larger than the others within garters.

It is probable that this piece of needlework originally served as a table cover for the "high table" in the dining hall. The large shields would appear in the center of the table, while the others would hang around the sides and so be easily seen. When the colors were fresh it must have presented an exceedingly handsome appearance.

As this table cover hung against the wall of the "Plaster Room," along the lower border were eleven shields of the Davenport family, and of those families connected with it by marriage. On the right-and left-hand borders were four shields each of other families con-

nected with the Davenports. Along the upper border were eleven shields of some Lancashire and Cheshire families, friends of the Davenports. The second from the left-hand corner is the arms of Southworth: Quarterly, 1 & 4 arg., a chev. betw. three cross-crosslets sa., Southworth, 2 & 3 sa., a chev. betw. three cross-crosslets arg., Dayas.

The three large shields in the middle of the tapestry are those of Queen Mary or Queen Elizabeth (quarterly France and England) who had the same arms, surrounded by the garter with the motto, "Honi soit qui mal y pense" in the center. On the right-hand side the arms of the celebrated Edward, third Earl of Derby, K.G., who died 1573; and on the left-hand side those of Francis Talbot, fifth earl of Shrewsbury, K.G., who died 1560. Each of these is similarly surrounded by the garter. From these dates it is a fair inference that the tapestry was worked between 1550 and 1560.

The Davenport arms was: Quarterly, 1 & 4 ar., a chev. betw. 3 cross-crosslets sa.; on the chevron a crescent for difference, Davenport; 2 & 3 a lion rampant or., Bromals.

This tapestry was probably worked for Sir William Davenport, Knt., who died 1577. [29, Vol. I, pp. 445, 450.]

The tapestry was sold at the sale at Bramhall Hall, and was purchased by Stephen Christy, Esq., who lives in the neighborhood.

All these Southworth arms, in Wells Cathedral, at Wyke Champ-flower, and in the tapestry table cloth, belonged to members of the Wells branch of the family, who descended from the second son of Sir John Southworth. The tinctures are the reverse of those given by Edmonston and of those in the Samlesbury Chapel. In a few of the descriptions the tincture gules was used instead of sable. The charges were the same, except in the shield of the branch in Ireland.

The motto was not a part of the coat of arms, but was added later and was selected by the bearer of the arms. The motto of the Southworths was "Sublimiora spectemus," Look at (seek) the higher things.

It is interesting that Robert Southey's family had, as arms, the same as the Southworth's,—sable, a chev. between three cross-crosslets arg.


ORIGIN OF SOUTHWORTH FAMILY

The family of Croft acquired their surname from the estate of Croft in West Derby Hundred. Roger de Croft, the first of the name, falconer to John, count of Mortain, probably died 1255. He was probably identical with Roger de Burton. He probably obtained Burton and Dalton by alliance with the family of Gillemichael de



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Whittington.* He was son of Orm de Ashton, who was son of Roger. He gave Dalton to his son Gilbert de Croft. Gilbert, his son, appears in the survey of 1212 as holding land in Croft and in Southworth (these were both members of the fee of Makerfield), also in Dalton in Lonsdale. Hugh de Croft, probably a brother of Gilbert, held land in Croft of said Gilbert.

Between October, 1213, and July, 1219, Gilbert de Croft, son of Roger de Croft, alienated Southworth and Croft to Gilbert, son of Hugh de Croft, which grant was duly confirmed by Thurston Banastre, lord of Makerfield. Thenceforth the grantee assumed the name of Southworth, and his son, as Gilbert, son of Gilbert de Southworth, had a grant of two oxgangs in Croft some time after 1232. [33, p. 70, n.]

This, then, was the origin of the Southworth family, which took its name from the estate of Southworth belonging to the Barony of Newton. The two manors, Southworth and Croft, were classed together for parochial purposes and were often named together. The family held a distinguished position among the landed gentry of Lancashire. Many of its members served their country in war or peace, being knights banneret or knights of the shire. son of Gilbert de Southworth, succeeded William de Southworth, whose name is on a document as witness in 1292 [45, Vol. XL, pp. 157, 158]. His son was Gilbert de Southworth, who lived about 1330. His son, Sir Gilbert de Southworth, married, before 1332, Alicia D'Ewyas. He was living in 1344; she was living in 1363; through her he became the lord of Samlesbury, which is situated between the Ribble on the north and the Darwen on the south, near the old Roman road running north through Warrington, Wigan, and Preston to Lancaster.

The Ribble was called by Ptolemy the "Belisama" [45, Vol. XVII, p. 264]. Samlesbury † is supposed to preserve a portion of the ancient name of the river, combined with the Saxon "bury," burg, or borough, meaning a fortified place. It is supposed to have been an old Roman outpost or fort — Fort of Belisama, Sama-bury. In comparatively recent times there was trace of a moat around the Hall [96].

The Ribble [19] takes its rise at Newby Head, about fifteen hundred

Thence the stream flows south and southwest to Preston, then westerly to enter the Irish Sea a few miles north of Liverpool Bay.

The valley of this stream recalls many historic events, for here were fought many ancient battles. This region is thought to have been the scene of whatever was true in the almost mythical adventures of Arthur and his knights of the Round Table. The defeat of St. Oswald of Northumbria by Penda, and his death, 642, occurred in Wakerfield (Maserfelt) in the vicinity of Winwick [57].

The ruins and remains of ancient churches, abbeys, halls, and castles are found along the course of the Ribble and its tributaries, speaking of manners and customs foreign to the present day.

On the Calder, about two miles above where it pours its waters into the Ribble, stood one of the earliest churches in England, Whalley Church or Chapel, "the White Church under the Leigh," so called from the fact that, being built of stone, it had a lighter color than those built of timber.

The rectors of this church of Whalley were called deans. They were also lords of the town, and married men; the office was transmitted by inheritance from father to son until 1225, when the decision of the Lateran Council required all ecclesiastics to be celibates.

The first dean of Whalley of whom there is record was Spartlingus, about 910. William Dobson [19, p. 46] says that the descent of the Southworths can be traced from this dean of Whalley. Joseph Barton [7] makes a similar statement.*

To Spartlingus (Spartlinge, Sparcling, Spracling) succeeded his son, Liwulphus Cutwulphus, so called because, while hunting on one occasion, he cut off a wolf's tail instead of his head [99].

To Cutwulphus succeeded his son Cudwolphus, then Henry the elder, and Robert. Robert's three sons followed one another, Henry the younger and William, who had no children, and Geoffrey the elder, who was followed by his son Geoffrey the younger. His son Roger was the last dean of Whalley. From Roger's brother Richard descended the Townleys, one of whom later married Jane Southworth, daughter of Richard Southworth.

Geoffrey the elder married the daughter of Roger de Lacy. Geoffrey the younger married the daughter of Gospatric of Samlesbury, sister of Roger de Samlesbury.

This Gospatric was the first recorded Lord of Samlesbury, living in the reign of Henry II (1154-1189). He founded a chapel at

Chapel of St. Leonard at Samlesbury

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Samlesbury for the use of his dependents, intended as a chapel of ease to the Church of Walton-le-Dale, then designated Law or Low Church. No burial ground was attached to this chapel, burials being still at the neighboring Church of Law. Between 1186 and 1191, two itinerant Irish bishops, during the absence of Hugh, Bishop of Lichfield, consecrated a cemetery in connection with this chapel [64, Vol. II, p. 292]. Later, Bishop Hugh de Nonant confirmed this consecration.

In 1400, Sir Thomas Southworth was granted license to have services celebrated in his mansions of Sothelworth and Samlesbury, the above-mentioned chapel founded by Gospatric being too distant from the Hall for convenience. The Chapel of Gospatric was neglected and, in 1558, Edward, earl of Derby, issued an appeal to his friends to re-edify the church at Samlesbury, as it was in ruins and endangering people that resorted there. The old parochial chapel of Samlesbury, now called St. Leonard's, had continued the burial place of the Southworths long after they had transferred the services to the more convenient oratory at their ancestral home. In this chapel. though the resting place of many Southworths, there is no memorial of the family, except the crested helmet, shield, and sword affixed to the north wall of the chancel, "the knightly ensign of some member of the Southworth family, whose name even in the lapse of time has become forgotten" [18, p. 42]. The view of St. Leonard's chapel shows the church as it now is. The tower is of recent construction. The ancient crest and shield and sword are valuable mementos of the family. No one knows when they were hung on the walls. Were they ever worn by him in whose memory they were thus placed, where they have remained for hundreds of years? The arms on the chancel wall are the oldest copy of the Southworth and D'Ewyas arms.

To Gospatric (Foot of Patric) succeeded his son Rogers, who married Margaret Oseber, daughter and heir of Walter Fitz Oseber, against her father's wishes. The documents do not specify where nor by whom the union was accomplished, whether the young couple ran away, eloped after modern fashion; nor do we know who performed the ceremony, whether it was Roger's brother-in-law, the dean of Whalley, or some other ecclesiastic. Rogerus fil. Gospatric was summoned to the king's court at Westminster, 14 Oct., 1194, to show why he married the daughter and heir of Walter fil. Oseber without the assent and license of Theobald Walter [99, p. 342].

William de Samlesbury, 1246, the grandson of Gospatric, married Avina de (Notton?) [33, pp. 130, 131]; had only three daughters. One of these had no children. Elizabeth married Sir Robert de Holand, from whom are descended the Holands, the earls of Kent and Hunt-

ingdon, the dukes of Surrey and Exeter. Half of Samlesbury estate went to the Holands. Avina de Samlesbury seems to have been a widow in 1257.

Cecily, the other daughter, married Sir John D'Ewyas (D'Evyas, D'Evyhus, Devyas) who died before 1311, in which year she was still living. By this marriage Sir John acquired the other moiety of the Samlesbury estate. There was a long legal contest before the inheritance was settled between Sir Holand and Sir D'Ewyas. The latter was knight of the shire in 1295 [1, p. 658], being member of Parliament that year for Lancashire [68, Vol. I, p. 173].

The granddaughter of Sir John D'Ewyas was named Alicia. She married Sir Gilbert de Southworth, lord of Southworth and Croft. In 1311, he is called Gilbert de Croft [42, p. 335]. He held also the mesne manors of Middleton, Houghton, and Erbury or Arbury [18, p. 38].

Alicia, then, married one who was at least her equal, if his estates did not number more than hers.

It is sometimes difficult to distinguish between Gilbert the father, and Sir Gilbert the son, when the latter is not given his title. Sir Gilbert was sheriff for the county Lancaster from 1323 to 1336 [68, Vol. I, pp. 267, 268]. Gilbert de Southworth was taxer and collector of County Lancaster in 1327 [58, Vol. II, p. 103].

The manor of Southworth,* whence the family get their name, is in the south of Lancashire in the parish of Winwick. In 1326, the manor of Southworth was confirmed to Gilbert by fine † made at Westminster 20 Jan., 1326. The manor of Southworth was thus settled on Gilbert de Southworth for his life with remainder to Gilbert, son of Gilbert, and his heirs by Alicia his wife, "and if he has no heirs by her, it shall remain to Gilbert de Southworth right heirs" [99, Vol. II, p. 345]. Thus it appears that Gilbert the father had the title confirmed to himself and his heirs. The estate was occupied by Gilbert before this transaction [42, Vol. I, pp. 18–73].

The ancient Hall of Southworth disappeared many years since, the present hall being comparatively a modern structure.

Samlesbury did not pass to Sir Gilbert until after 1325-26, as in that year Nich'us Deuyas is recorded as Lord of Samlesbury, and Gilbertus Sotheworth as lord of Sotheworth manor [42, p. 71].

The earliest buildings which were on the site of Samlesbury Hall have disappeared, said to have been burned by the Scots in one of

their numerous raids. In 1322, they crossed the Ribble, pushing their invasion as far as, or beyond, Samlesbury [99, Vol. II, p. 344]. The present hall was built in the fourteenth century, as evidenced by its architecture; the date given is 1335. It was built by Sir Gilbert, who may have received with his wife only the charred and blackened ruins of the old hall.

Originally Samlesbury Hall was in the form of a hollow square, with one side open, the whole surrounded by a moat, which could be traced in quite recent times, before the new road between Preston and Blackburn, which runs near the hall, was built. On entering the square from the unoccupied side, in front was the hall, on the right were the servants' quarters, while on the left were the apartments for the lord and his family. The servants' quarters on the right disappeared long ago; the family apartments have been remodeled or rebuilt since the time of Sir Gilbert, and that wing has been extended so as to provide accommodations for the servants. The hall is now the most ancient portion of the structure, and from the manner in which it is built and the material, as well as from the style of architecture, it must have been built between 1327 and 1377.

James Croston [18] gives a very full and clear account of the hall as it was in 1871. The hall is seen on the right of the view of the north front, as if it were an L projecting from the north front. The oriel window can be seen near the junction of the hall with the north front. It is this window which gives the light in the end of the room as seen in the interior view. (See frontispiece.) Other authors give more detailed descriptions of the earlier appearance of the Hall and mention the alterations which different owners have made in the way of repairs and "restorations."

The Hall is built of timber much heavier than more modern parts of the building. The sills rest on stone foundations, the frame is of heavy oak timbers with horizontal beams and braces. The interstices between the woodwork are filled with brick and a rough plaster made of lime, mud, and clay mixed with rushes and laid on lathes. The Hall is thirty-three feet long, twenty-six feet, six inches wide; from floor to the spring of the roof is fourteen feet, six inches, and to the ridge is twenty-nine feet, seven inches, occupying the entire height and width of the structure. The roof is said to be an excellent specimen of fourteenth century work. It is supported by oak timbers, twelve by eighteen inches, arching over to meet their opposite. Each two are said to have been cut from one tree, retaining mostly the natural arch of the tree with its branches. The marks of the carpenter's adze can be clearly seen on the rafters of the roof. "The principal timbers are carved with great elegance and the com-

partments of the roof painted with figures of saints, while the outsides of the building are adorned with profile heads cut in bold relief, within huge medallions. It is curious to observe that the inner doors are without a panel or lock, and have always been opened, like those of modern cottages, with a latch and string" [64].

This description was written in 1870. Now the doors are of modern construction and have knobs, as can be seen in the view of the interior. (See frontispiece.)

Formerly the Hall was longer, and a screen, which can now be seen in the photograph at the upper end, was then at the lower and served to screen the entrance for the servants from the kitchen, there being an opening at each end of it for their entrance and exit. At the other or upper end of the Hall was a recess arched over, with a raised floor, a dais. The present gallery, called the music gallery by Croston, which can be seen in the view of the interior at the end of the Hall, with the "screen" below it, is a recent addition.

Originally there was no fireplace, that now seen in the center of one side of the room being a modern addition. Chimneys were almost unknown in England until the fifteenth century. A very few remains show that there were some chimneys in the twelfth century, but they were very rare [83, Vol. I, p. 17]. The fire was made on a brazier or hearth in the center of the hall and the smoke found its way out through an opening in the dome of the roof.

Later, in the center of the west side of the Hall, a wide fireplace was built, measuring fifteen feet between the jambs, which support a low arch. Here one of the roof timbers rose from the floor and sprang across to form the arch of the roof. This supporting timber was cut off and an ornamental corbel was inserted above the fireplace to give the needed strength and to support the roof.


This hall was restored by Sir Thomas Southworth in 1732. He also built the present south front, which is over one hundred feet long, with brick facing and stone dressing and basement. On the south front there are three chimneys showing on the outside. On one was a shield with the Southworth arms. The vines and foliage of the shrubbery so hide the south front that none of the interesting details can be seen. A window in the east end is said to have been brought from Whalley Abbey, and this does not show. The north front, facing on the quadrangle, is built of timber and plaster like the Hall.

After Samlesbury Hall passed out of the Southworth family it fell into decay and was in a dilapidated condition, having been used as a poor and inferior public house, until Mr. Harrison bought it. His son, William Harrison, Esq., F.S.A., repaired and restored it and

lived there after 1870. Through the interest these two took in the ancient Hall, James Croston was able to write his interesting book [18] in which are preserved the records and documents, the history of the Southworth family, which were found in a chest stored away in the old building. The Hall is now in a good state of preservation, as may be seen from the views herewith given from photographs taken in 1905 by the kind permission of the present occupants.

The immediate heir and successors of Sir Gilbert have left few records and memorials of themselves. All except one or two were knights of the shire or knights banneret; hence we know that they served their country in either civil or military capacity. A few are mentioned as "miles" and later with the knightly title. They also served as judges in the manorial court of Samlesbury.

It is probable that Sir Gilbert's son Richard succeeded him, for it is recorded that William, Lord Lovell, Burnell and de Holand and Richard de Southworth held of the duke of Lancaster the manor of Samlesbury in socage for the service of twelve shillings per annum [42, p. 55]. This was about 1352 or a little later.

In the visitations which give the Southworth family, the successor of Sir Gilbert is given as Sir John. It would seem most probable that Richard had no children, did not live long after coming into possession of the estate, and so no mention was made of him in the visitations.

Sir John, son of Sir Gilbert, is said to have been at the battle of Agincourt, and also to have died 5 Oct., 1415, at the siege of Harfleur, of dysentery. It is impossible to reconcile the two statements. The latter, that he died in 1415, is correct, as in the post-mortem inquisition he is said to have died next Sabbath after the feast of St. Michael the Archangel, third year of Henry V, i. e., 5 Oct., 1415 [82, pp. 114, 117].

He married Margaret de Hoghton, daughter of Sir Richard de Houghton, descended from William de Warren.

His son, Sir Thomas de Southworth, was member of Parliament for County Lancaster [68, Vol. I, p. 285]. He married Joan, widow of Sir Thomas Sherburne, daughter of John del Bothe of Barton by his first wife Johan, daughter of Sir Henry Trafford, the representative of the ancient house of that name, which was seated at Trafford, County Lancaster, from the time of Ranulphus, the Thane of Trafford, who lived in the reigns of Canute and Edward the Confessor. In 1400, Sir Thomas had license granted by the Bishop of Lichfield to have service celebrated in his mansions of Sothelworth and Samlesbury, thus establishing the fact that a chapel was attached to the mansion thus early. When he died, in 1432, he held with his wife,

Johanna, thirteen messuages, two hundred acres of land, forty acres of prati, forty bushel of bosci, one hundred acres tubarie, one hundred acres pasture at Croft and Erbury, besides other land in Midelton, Hogton, Erbury, Southworth and Croft, Meller Overderwynd, Aston, Ribchester, Pulton, and Wolston.

Sir Thomas Southworth's heir was Richard de Southworth, who married Elizabeth Molineux, daughter of Richard Molineux, a descendant of William des Molines, one of the Norman nobles who came to England with William the Conqueror.

Sir Christopher de Southworth succeeded his father Richard, as Lord of Samlesbury. He married Isabel Dutton, daughter of Sir Thomas Dutton of Dutton, whose descent from eight of the barons who were sureties for the observation of the Magna Charta is given in "The Magna Charta Barons."*

Sir John Southworth, son and heir of Sir Christopher, married Helen Langton, daughter of Sir Richard Langton. The descent of Helen Langton is in part the same as that of Margaret Hoghton and is given later in detail, being of more than usual interest. Sir John died in 1519.

In 1511, Sir John had a quarrel with John Paslew, abbot of Whalley, in regard to the ownership of a lot of land. On Saturday, in Easter week, 1514, he was able, as sheriff, to suppress a small riot, which gives an insight into the customs of that time and so is worth mention. Thomas Boteler, Esq., with a large company of friends, went, by previous appointment, into a field, one side from the highway, to enjoy the pleasures of a cock fight, "after the manner of the country there used." On their return from the sport "so it was that Hugh Hyndley, gentleman, Robert Gerrard, gentleman," and others, numbering eighty or more, among them Sir Thomas Gerrard, "arrayed in manner of war, with force and arms, assembled at Wynwhick, within a quarter of a mile of the place where the cock fight was to be . . . intending to murder him." The evidence is given quite fully, and it seems that the complaint was an exaggeration and, to some degree, a misrepresentation of the facts. The two parties met, had angry words, then fell to blows. Sir John Southworth kept aloof from the quarrel till he saw that Sir Thomas Gerrard and his adherents were like to punish the other party too severely "and would probably have slain them all," when he interfered and stopped the riot; the case was heard at full length and referred to the Duchie Chamber at Westminster [63, Vol. I, p. 61]. His son Christopher was the ancestor of the Southworths of Wells, County Somerset.

Sir Thomas, son and heir of Sir John, first married Ann Stanly, from whom he was divorced; he married, second, Margery Boteler, daughter of Thomas Boteler. He restored Samlesbury Hall in 1532, and erected the minstrels' gallery. He also built the southeast wing, which forms the main part of the structure, and completed it in 1545. He was at the battle of Flodden, 9 Sept., 1513, and in one of the ballards is alluded to as

"The sad Southworth that ever was sure."

He was high sheriff of the county in 1542. On several occasions he was a member of commissions to hear testimony and decide as to the truth in certain legal cases. He seems to have been of an arbitrary disposition and unpleasant to deal with, a man of strong will, who was determined to have his orders obeyed where he had a right to command.

John, abbot of the Monastery of our Blessed Lady of Whalley and the convent of the same, complained of him, that with forty other evil disposed persons he had, with force and arms, without any right or other cause except that he is so grate kyndrede, alliaunce, ffrendshyppe, strength, and power that he supposed that no indifferent trial can be had against him in the county, in May last he entered the premises and broke the ditches and hedges and carried out turves and other fuel. He was also accused of abstracting a "bleder" or purse containing one hundred marks, which had been intrusted to him by William Plumtre, Chaplain of Bewsey.

Sir John Southworth, son of Sir Thomas, came into possession of Samlesbury and many other estates on the death of his father in 1546. He married, 23 July, 1557, at Leonard's Middleton, Mary Ashton, daughter of Sir Richard Ashton, Knt. He was high sheriff of the county in 1562; member of Parliament in 1566. He supported three hundred men in the war against the Scots in the latter part of the reign of Mary. During this service he received the commendation of his commanding officers. Lord Eure and Thomas, lord of Wharton, writing to the Earl of Shrewsbury, 22 Oct., 1557, in regard to the gentlemen of Lancashire in service against the Scots, say of Sir John Southworth, "and since our letter written with Mr. Tunstall wherein we named also Sir John Southworth his going away, he hath request to us that would be a means to yr Lordship that he might continue in service here with his hundred men, and to have also put to his leading another hundred footmen. He says he is a young man, and desirous to know service in war, and as we think him to be commended therein, being a toward and tall gentleman, we require of yr L'ship to favour this his honest suit, and we thought good to suffer his tarry until we shall know yr L'ship's commandment therin." So they sent off Captain Woodward with his band instead of Sir John Southworth [99, Vol. II, p. 369].

Sir John served his country during Mary's reign, and, later, though he was a Romanist, he continued his service under Elizabeth, and no one suspected his loyalty to the state. In 1574, he was called upon to furnish for the use of the realm

In 1553, Samlesbury was expected to furnish twelve men.

In the troublous times of Elizabeth's reign, Lancashire was a center of Romanish influence and did not yield readily to the Act of Uniformity. Sir John Southworth was especially conspicuous by his violent opposition to the Reformed faith. Romanist priests went through the land to cheer their flocks, to administer the offices of their religion. Many of these were foreigners and were often guilty of plotting against the government and tried to induce the people to rise against the queen. Any who harbored these priests exposed themselves to suspicion, and stringent laws were passed against all recusants. Attending mass or engaging in any of the ceremonies of their religion was punished by fine and imprisonment. Informers were ever ready to furnish the government information in regard to violations of these laws. Sir John Southworth exposed himself to suspicion and came under surveillance.

"At the lodge in Samlesburie Parke there be masses daily and Seminaries resort thither."

"This appeareth by the presentment of Theo. Sherples: . . . James Cowper a seminary priest, receipted relieved and maintained at the lodge of Sir John Southworth in Samlesburie Park by Mr. Tho. Southworth, one of the younger sons of the said Sir John. . . . And the said Priest sayeth mass at the said lodge and at the said Ward's house, whither resort Mr. Southworth, Mistress Ann Southworth, Thomas Southworth" [6, Vol. III, p. 18]. Fr. Edmund Campion, a Jesuit priest, traveled through the north of England, comforting and confirming the Romanists in their faith. He stayed much with Sir John Southworth while in Lancashire. He was very eloquent and persuasive in his preaching. He was executed in 1581, at Tyburn, on a charge of high treason.

It is said that Sir John was arrested specially for harboring this priest [44, p. 22].

As early as 1568 he had been called before the Archbishop Parker

and ordered to sign a submission, acknowledging that he had received into his house certain priests and had not conformed to the state religion, absenting himself from his parish church and had not received the Holy Communion. He was also ordered to promise to obey the queen's authority in all matters of religion and orders ecclesiastical; not to speak against the established religion and not to receive, assist, maintain, relieve, or comfort any persons living out of the realm known to be offenders against the laws. He refused to subscribe to this order, further than in regard to maintaining disorderly persons.

In 1581, Sir John was arrested as a recusant and lodged in the New Fleet prison at Manchester. He had many friends high in authority in the government; he had wealth, possessing many manors and much landed property. His previous services pleaded for him. He was kindly treated, was allowed liberty to exercise in the garden, and, later, to walk outside with a keeper. He was allowed a servant, and would have been released on bail had he been willing. His children believed that if released on bail he would be subject to more annoyance than if he remained a prisoner. His sons used their influence in his favor.

His son Thomas, reported in 1575 with his father for attending mass, as already noted, became a Protestant, was the first of the family to leave the old church. His father was incensed by this, and his resentment was kept alive by his daughter Margaret, wife of Bartholomew Hasketh, who is said by Walsingham to have been of "bad disposition" and she "doth much hurte in being at liberty to go where she will," amongst recusants and like persons. So she was apprehended and committed.

In 1584, Sir Francis Walsingham writes: "And moreover whereas my lords be likewise enformed that Sir John Southworth hath a purpose to disinherite his eldest sonne, onely because the young gentleman, as is said is not ill affected like the father, but well given in religion & to dispose his lands upon some other his children.

"Their lordships would have you inquier & learn what you can of this purpose of Sir John & to certify hither as you shall understand thereof; to the end that in case the bad father have so ill a meanynge towards his eldest & best son, some order, by their lordships means, may be taken for to stay his purpose, & preserve the inheritance for his right heire" [62].

Sir John's health suffered from his confinement, and in 1584, the lords of the Council decreed that he should be sent under bail to London, at the request of his eldest son, "they having been enformed the son is well given in religion & for his better encouragement they desire this to be granted the father." So the father went to London

with his son, and the aunt was arrested and put where she could no longer exert an influence prejudicial to the son.

According to documents still extant, Sir John was in London in 1584, 1589, 1590. In 1588, his name was given, with others, in a list of names of gentlemen of the best calling within the county of Lancaster "whereof choyse is to be made of a certain number to lend unto her majesty money upon private seals in January, 1588" [14, Vol. III]. This money was to defray expenses connected with the resistance to the Spanish Armada. Of two hundred and twenty-six named in the list not thirty have left descendants in the male line living on their ancestral property.

In 1592, while Sir John was in London, his house in Lancashire was ransacked to find incriminating documents against him or others. He returned to Samlesbury in 1594. It does not appear whether that was his first return after going to London in 1584; but it seems probable from the way mention of the return is made that it was.

Sir John Southworth was becoming an old man; he had suffered much from persecution, which he must have felt to be unjust, for he was always a loyal subject and a patriotic citizen. His imprisonments had affected his health; his estate had suffered loss from the heavy fines imposed and from neglect during his absence. This was the beginning of the change of fortune, which in a little less than a hundred years led to the entire alienation of the estates, and the family ceased to occupy the position of influence and prominence which had been theirs for some three centuries. On the 17th of September, 1595, he made his will, and no doubt, as he says at the beginning, he was "weake in Bodie but of perfect remembrance." In less than two months, on 3 Nov., 1595, he died.

When Cecily, daughter of William de Samlesbury, married Sir John D'Ewyas, she brought him only half of the original Samlesbury estates. The other moiety was inherited by her sister Elizabeth, who married Sir Robert Holand. That half of the estate descended to the heirs of Sir Robert Holand, passed by marriage to Sir John Lovel, and when Francis, Lord Lovel, was attainted after the battle of Bosworth Field, this moiety of Samlesbury was granted Thomas Stanley, first Earl of Derby. Edward, third Earl of Derby, held his manor court at Samlesbury in conjunction with Sir John Southworth in 1557, and in that year is dated a record of verdicts in the Court of Henry, fourth earl of Derby, and Sir John Southworth for this manor. From the records of this manorial court we learn much in regard to the habits, customs, and manners of the time in which lived Sir John Southworth, the grandfather of Edward Southworth, whose two sons came to Plymouth. The offenses mentioned are keeping gam-

ing houses, alehouses without license, lodging vagabonds, suspected persons or persons of evil disposition, and beggars; many were convicted because they "maid a tuskyll [tussel] or a hobleshove upon" others, and sometimes it is stated that they drew blood. Other offenses were cutting or gathering firewood on land where they had no right so to do, breaking down hedges, or inclosing waste land. James Croston [18] remarks upon these records: "It is to be feared that in Lancashire the mass of the people were at this period neither very refined nor very virtuous. Delighting in cruel sports, such as bull-baiting, bear-baiting, and given to all manner of unlawful gaming, lewdness, and boisterous revelry; the alehouses, to which the more dissolute resorted, were the scenes of riots and feuds which not only caused annoyance and scandal to the more well disposed, but endangered the public peace to a greater degree than we can now easily conceive, and in the interests of morality, it became necessary for those in authority to suppress by all lawful means such disorderly proceedings."

Thomas Southworth, eldest son of Sir John, was born in 1561. In 1575, when fourteen years old, he was reported as present at Roman Catholic mass. He became a Protestant, and is spoken of as the first Protestant in the family. While his father was a prisoner in the Fleet, he was assiduous in looking after his welfare, and used his influence to have the severity of his imprisonment lessened as much as possible. There are few records of Thomas Southworth's life after his father's death. His estate was heavily encumbered by debts incurred by Sir John in consequence of the legal costs and fines which he had to pay on account of the persecution he suffered for his adhesion to the Romanist faith.

Thomas married Rosamond Lister, daughter of William Lister, of Thornton, in Craven County, York. He had a large family, seven sons and four daughters, who were living in 1595, when their grandfather made his will, and were all mentioned in the will. Two of these were Thomas and Edward, who were probably the Thomas and Edward present at Leyden in 1613.

When Sir John Southworth died in 1595, an inventory of his estate was made, a post mortem, as it was then called. A copy of this will shows the extent of the property under the control of the Southworths at this time [18, p. 88].



The parentage of Edward Southworth, who was at Leyden in 1611-13, is not known with absolute certainty; that is, no documentary evidence has, as yet, been discovered to prove who was his father. Certain facts and conditions lead to a reasonable conclusion that he was the son of Thomas Southworth of Samlesbury.

A tradition existed that Alice Carpenter's father objected to her marriage with the young man Bradford, and preferred Edward Southworth because the latter was of much better family, so would be a better match [84, p. 116]. There was also a general belief and tradition that the family in Europe was a knightly family.

Edward Southworth, the father of Constant and Thomas, was at Leyden in 1611, present at marriages of his friends [5, pp. 162, 163].

In 1613, he was married there to Alice Carpenter; his brother Thomas was present at his marriage as one of the best men or witnesses. In tracing the ancestry of Edward it is necessary, then, to find a family in which there were two brothers, Thomas and Edward, of such age that Edward might be married in 1613 to a lady of twenty-two or twenty-three years of age.

In the records of St. Antholen Church, London, are entries of the christenings in the family of Richard Southworth; Thomas was christened in 1555, Edward in 1561. These two brothers were evidently too old to have been the Leyden Southworths.

Several suggestions have been made in regard to the parentage of Edward Southworth. One line is given in Winsor's "History of Duxbury," which has gained such a wide credence that it may be well to show how unfounded it is. Correcting a few mistakes, the line is as follows: Sir John Southworth, died 1519, had two children, Sir Thomas, eldest son and heir, and Christopher. The latter had two children, John, who died childless, and Edward, died in 1573; married Jane, daughter of Edward Lloyd, of Lloynmayne, County Salop. Edward is described as a merchant of London. He had two children, Henry and Thomas. Henry was of Weeks-Champflower, County Somerset, living in 1623; married Elizabeth, daughter of John Pellsant, of London, merchant: he had two children, Jane and Margaret. Thomas, second son of Edward, was recorder of Wells, living in 1623; married Jane, daughter of Nicholas Mynne, of Norfolk.

This Thomas of Wells, is mentioned in Winsor's "History of Duxbury" as father of Thomas, who is named as the father of Constant and Thomas, of Plymouth. It has been known for many years that this was not true; that the father of Constant was Edward; so those who have accepted this line of descent have corrected Winsor and give Thomas, recorder of Wells, a son Edward, which he never had.

Thomas, recorder of Wells, was born in 1564, was a graduate of Queen's College, Cambridge; was entered at Grays Inn, 26 May, 1587 [38]. He was a member of Parliament; he died in 1625. In Barrow Gurney Church is a flat stone in memory of Thomas Southworth.

Edward, the father of Thomas, died in 1573; in his will, made in 1567, he speaks of his son, Thomas, as not of age. Thomas's mother married, second, Francis Gunter, who furnished the means for Thomas to obtain an education.

Thomas in his nuncupative will gives everything to his wife.

Jane, widow of Edward, mother of Thomas, married, second, Francis Gunter, by whom she had children, died in 1617. In her will, made in 1612, she makes no mention of any children of Thomas,

though she mentions him and his wife Jane; she mentions also her son Henry Southworth, and his wife Elizabeth, his daughter Jane, her own daughters by Francis Gunter, and the sons of her daughter Blanche. She mentions also her brother Hugh, her three sisters, her three cousins, and two daughters of a cousin [2].

Henry Southworth, brother of Thomas, in his will, dated 23 May, 1625, mentions his two daughters Margaret, wife of Arthur Duke, and Jane Bull; he also mentions his sister James, his brother Smith, his brother Fellgate, his brother Southworth, his deceased wife. He directs that he should be buried in the chapel at Wicke [2].

Thomas Southworth, recorder of Wells, was born in 1564, was a lawyer in 1587; was recorder of Wells in 1618; died in 1625; was of sufficient note to have a memorial stone in the church at Barrow Gurney. In his will he makes no mention of child or grandchild. If Edward, father of Constant, had been his son, Constant and Thomas, Edward's children, his grandchildren, were living, probably, at Wrington, only ten or twelve miles from Wells when he made his will. It is improbable that he would have made no mention of them, even in a nuncupative will.

Thomas's mother made her will in 1612, and in that no mention is made of any children of Thomas, though she names many of her relatives, even cousins and cousins' children. Is it reasonable to suppose that she would have made no mention of either of the sons of Thomas, if he had had any?

Henry Southworth, brother of Thomas, in his will says nothing about any children of Thomas, but does mention Thomas.

All the visitations [91, 92], in which are recorded the families of Thomas and Henry, mention the children of Henry; mention no children of Thomas.

Surely the children of one so prominent in the city of Wells would have been mentioned in some way, if he had had any. It seems a fair inference from these facts that Thomas had no children; and that the statements to the contrary, which are found, so far as I know, only this side the water, are erroneous.

One of the earliest suggestions as to the origin of Edward Southworth was that he belonged to the family which lived in Wellam, Nottinghamshire. According to the Visitation of Nottinghamshire [89], Edward Southworth married Ann Elsam; he had two sisters, Elizabeth and Margaret. He was of Claborough and Wellam, living in 1614. His father was Robert Southworth, of Claborough, son of Richard, of Claborough and Wellam, who was son of Aymond Southworth, of Wellam, who lived about the time of Henry VIII. No dates are given. This was supposed to have been the family to

which Edward, the father of Constant and Thomas, belonged, chiefly because they lived in the vicinity of Scrooby, whence many of the Pilgrims started for Holland. It seems to have been overlooked that the emigrants to Holland came from all over the middle and south of England. Several came from London, others from Berks, Cambridge, Kent, York, Norfolk, Leicester, Suffolk, Essex, the Isle of Wight, in Hants, Somerset, as well as from Nottinghamshire [5]; Standish came from Lancashire. It would seem that locality need not be considered in trying to decide whence any one connected with the Pilgrims came.

The above Edward was certainly not the father of Constant and Thomas, who came here in 1628. His wife, in 1614, was Ann Elsam, not Alice Carpenter.

In the records of Claborough is found the record of the birth of an Edward, born 1585, and a Thomas born 1583 [72], sons of a Richard who married Imogene Aston in 1569. Richard had ten children, the third and fourth were Thomas, born 28 July, 1583, and Edward, born 12 April, 1585.

Richard Southworth, father of these children, was undoubtedly the brother of Robert, born too early to be entered in the Claborough records. Hence Thomas and Edward were cousins of the Edward who appears in the Visitation of Nottinghamshire.

Their ages were such that Thomas and Edward may have been at Leyden in 1611 and 1613. There is, however, nothing to connect them with the two brothers who were there.

This Claborough family had for arms either: Gules, a chev. betw. 3 cross-crosslets arg.; or, Arg., a chev. gules betw. 3 cross-crosslets sa. [6, Vol. XV, p. 256, and Vol. VIII, p. 248]. These are those of the Samlesbury family with changes of color, signifying a younger branch of the family.

Sir John Southworth, who died at the siege of Harfleur in 1415, had estates in Lancashire, Yorkshire, Lincolnshire, and Nottinghamshire, which he disposed of in 1409 before he went to France [82]. His son, Sir Thomas de Southworth, died in 1432, and in his post mortem, or inventory of his estates, mention is made only of estates in Lancashire, Southworth and Croft, Middleton, Hoghton, Erbury, Samlesbury, Meller Overderwynd, and Aston, Ribchester, Pulton, and Wolston [82]. As the family at Claborough, Nottinghamshire, sprang from the Samlesbury family, as shown by their arms, it is reasonable to believe that while Sir John gave his eldest son and heir his estates in Lancashire, he gave his estates in other counties to others, that in Nottinghamshire to the founder of the Claborough family.

Another pair of brothers, Edward and Thomas, is found in the Samlesbury family, whose history has been given above. They were of age to fill the requirements necessary in the Edward who married Alice Carpenter.

Sir John Southworth, who made his will in 1595, names in the order of their birth, his seven grandsons, children of Thomas, his eldest son. They were John, Thomas, William, Richard, Michael, Christopher, Edward. Thomas, the father, was the first Protestant in the family. The persecution of their grandfather would not be likely to give rise to very favorable feelings towards the Established Church. The resources of the estate were severely taxed by the fines and other expenses attending the prosecution of the grandfather. Edward, a seventh son, would not be likely to have a very large share in the income from what remained available. He and his five younger brothers were to receive an annuity of twenty nobles each during their natural lives,—between six and seven pounds. One need not be surprised at his leaving home.

There is one clew to the identity of Edward Southworth, of Leyden, which throws considerable light on his origin. While the Pilgrims were at Dartmouth, England, having put in there on account of the unseaworthy condition of the "Speedwell," Robert Cushman wrote a letter to his friend, Edward Southworth, which is quoted on page 2. This letter was addressed to Edward Southworth, at Henige House, in the Dukes Place, London.

Dukes Place is thus described; "In or about 1531, Henry VIII gave the Priory of the Holy Trinity, called Christ Church, on the right hand within Aldgate, founded by Queen Matilda, daughter of Malcolm, king of Scotland, wife of Henry I, to Sir Thomas Audley. He pulled down the priory and built a noble mansion and dwelt in it during his life, and died there in the year 1544. The estate descended through his only daughter to Thomas, Duke of Norfolk, and was then called the Dukes Place." [56.]

A little more to the northwest was a religious house, called the "Papey." Next to this was one great house, with handsome courts and garden plats, sometime pertaining to the Bassets, since that to the abbots of Bury in Suffolk; and, therefore, called Buries Mark, corruptly Bevis Marks; and since the Dissolution of the Abbey of Bury to Thomas Heneage the father, and Sir Thomas Heneage the son.

There are two maps of this part of London, one dated 1633, the other dated 1754 [78, 79]. The map of 1633 probably gives the streets as they were in the time of Edward Southworth, in that it may be seen that Dukes Place is not the name of any one street, but is given to several streets in the same district; there is also a Dukes Place

Court and a little Dukes Place. On the map of 1754 no street is called Dukes Place, but the name is given the whole section and includes the portion in which the streets on the former map were called Dukes Place. Between Dukes Place and the Heneage House is a lane which led to Bevis Marks. When the Bury Abbey was demolished the grounds were built over. One of the new streets was called Heneage Lane and another Bury or Berry Street, both leading into Bevis Marks. The Heneage House, then, was on three streets, Heneage Lane, Bevis Marks, and Berry Street.

The Heneage family was of Lincolnshire origin; it seems to have little connection with Nottinghamshire. I find record of only one marriage between a Heneage and any one from Nottinghamshire. There are records of two or three marriages between persons named Heneage and residents of Lancashire.

Robert Heneage, father of Sir Thomas Heneage of Henaege House, was auditor of the Duchy of Lancaster [49,53]. Sir Thomas Heneage was appointed chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster in 1590 [86, Vol. III, p. 219]. Michael Heneage, brother of Sir Thomas Heneage, sat in Parliament for Wigan, County Lancaster, in 1593 [68, Vol. II, p. 202].

It will be remembered that Sir Francis Walsingham took an interest in the welfare of Thomas Southworth, when there was fear lest Sir John should disinherit his eldest son. While Sir John was in London his son Thomas was with him; he pleaded for him during his imprisonment in the Fleet; he sought to lighten the persecution of his father. Sir Francis, to whom he must have applied, lived across the street from the Heneage House, in the house which one time belonged to James Lancaster, on the three streets, Berry Street, Bevis Marks, and St. Mary Axe. It would not be singular if Thomas Southworth had known Sir Thomas Heneage, and, considering the standing and wealth of the Southworth family, should have been entertained by him. It would, then, be perfectly natural that Edward Southworth should stop at the Heneage House when he was in London.

The knowledge that one of the Leyden Pilgrims came from the immediate vicinity of Samlesbury, and that his family had for many years been neighbors and friends of the Samlesbury Southworths, would add much to the probability that the Pilgrim Edward Southworth was from that family.

All the estates mentioned in the will of Myles Standish as belonging to his family were within eight to twenty miles of Samlesbury.

It is not improbable that Myles Standish, Edward and Thomas Southworth were friends and so together joined the Pilgrim band.

Is it not singular that in a family of the limited size of the Southworth, for it could not have been a very large family, there should have been three pairs of brothers with names Thomas and Edward, living at about the same time? It is extremely improbable that a fourth pair with those names should have been living at that time. I think we may conclude that we have an exhaustive knowledge of all the Thomas and Edward Southworths who were contemporary with Alice Carpenter. If this is true, the probability is so great as to amount almost to a certainty that the Edward Southworth of Samlesbury was the father of the Southworths who came to Plymouth.

 - (1)* "495. This year came two leaders into Britain, Cerdic and Cynric, his son, with five ships, at a place that is called Cerdics' Ore and they fought with the Welsh the same day." Thus briefly does the old Saxon Chronicle [70] record one of the most important events in the history of the English nation. Twenty-four years later, after defeating Arthur and obliging him to yield Hants and Somerset, Cerdic caused himself to be crowned king of Wessex, at Winchester.

This invasion of Britain established on the throne of Wessex a ruler who was destined to be the forefather of nearly all the sovereigns of England. "Every prince who has ruled Eng-

land before and since the eleventh century has had the blood of Cerdic, the West Saxon, in his veins " [39, Vol. I, p. 23]. Cerdic died in 534 and was succeeded by his son

- (2) Cynric, who came to England with him, 534-560. He cultivated science and letters and sought peace. He was followed by his son
- (3) Ceawlin, 560-592. He extended his dominion by wars and conquests; died in 592. After his death Col or Ceolrie, his nephew,* was chosen king from the other branch of the family. It is not necessary to follow this line, as Alfred comes from the direct line of Ceawlin whose son was

His brother, the other son of Cenred, was in the direct line of descent to Alfred and was named

- (13) Ethelwulf, 836-854, who married Osburga, daughter of Oslac. He married, second, Judith, daughter of Charles the Bald, emperor and king of France. By her he had no children. Two of his sons succeeded him, one died, the other was killed in battle. They were followed by their youngest brother,
- (14) Alfred the "Great," born 849, reigned 871-901. He married Elswitha, daughter of the Earl of Lincolnshire, by whom he had a son Edward, 901-924, and a daughter, Elstrude, Alfrida, or Ethelswytha [52, Vol. VII, p. 65; 68, Vol. II, p. 164].

The millennial of Alfred's death was observed in 1901. In

^{*} The kingly succession was not directly hereditary among the early Saxons. The king was chosen by the chief men of the kingdom, the nobility. One of the royal family was chosen, as a rule, but the choice might fall on a cousin or a nephew, rather than on a son. So the royal dignity changed from one line to another of the family of Cerdic. connection with that anniversary a book was published, giving sketches of Alfred in his different relations to his people [3]. No better idea of Alfred as king and as man can be obtained than by quoting from this volume:

"Of all the names in history there is only our English Alfred whose record is without stain and without weakness — who is equally amongst the greatest of men in genius, in magnanimity, in valour, in moral purity, in intellectual force, in practical wisdom, and in beauty of soul. In his recorded career from infancy to death, we can find no single trait that is not noble and suggestive, nor a single act or word that can be counted as a flaw."

His "firm determination to link the Divine Law and the Human Law: this firm reliance on the Divine Law as the foundation of all law: is to me the most characteristic point in the whole of Alfred's work."

"Alfred has left us his own conception of what a king should be, 'Power is never good, unless he be good that has it; so it is the good of the man, not of the power. If power be goodness, therefore is it that no man by his dominion can come to the virtues, and to merit; but by his virtues and merit he comes to dominion and power. Thus no man is better for his power; but if he be good, it is from his virtues that he is good."

Alfred was careful for the welfare of his people; he promoted everything which would aid the progress of his kingdom in its highest interests. His career as a warrior is well known; at first defeat, then victory. During his whole public life he suffered pain, at times severe pain, from a malady which could not be cured. The following gives a very full summary of Alfred's efforts and undertakings:

"And with all this spiritual fervour, this literary genius, this passion for culture, how wonderful is the many-sided energy of the man, — his skill and delight as a huntsman, his love of ballad, anecdotes and merry tale, his love of all noble art, his zeal as a great builder, his ingenuity in mechanical contrivance, his invention for measuring time, his planning a new type of battleship; his supreme foresight in refounding the desolated city of London. No man ever so perfectly fulfilled the rule 'Without haste, without rest.' 'I have desired,' he wrote, 'to live worthily while I lived, and after my life to leave to men that should be after me a remembrance in good works.'

"Alfred's name is almost the only one in the long roll of our national worthies which awakens no bitter, no jealous thought, which combines the honour of all; Alfred represents at once the ancient monarchy, the army, the navy, the law, the literature, the poetry, the art, the enterprise, the industry, the religion of our race."

This is no fulsome praise, but sober truth, fully deserved by Alfred, as testified to by his own writings and by the evidence of his contemporaries and by the works which he accomplished. His daughter

- (15) Elstrude, Ethelswytha, or Alfrita, became the wife of Baldwin II, Count of Flanders, who was the son of Baldwin I and Judith, daughter of Charles the Bald, widow of Ethelwulf [52]. Baldwin II was a turbulent lord, quarreled and fought with the king. "He was the irreconcilable enemy of those whose interests crossed his." His son by Elstrude, daughter of Alfred, was
- (16) Arnold I [52], Count of Flanders, who extended his territory by conquest. He suffered much by reason of a surgical disorder, which rendered an operation necessary. He was timid and fearful. The surgeons, in order to encourage him, operated before him on eighteen persons similarly affected, seventeen of whom recovered. He still hesitated, and went to Gerard, abbot of Brogue, who besought him to repair the evil he had done and to lead a new life, celebrated mass before him, administered the communion, and sent him away cured. He died 965. His wife was Ales or Athela, daughter of Herbert II, count of Vermandois. (See 51.) Their son,

(17) Baldwin III [52], was associated with his father in the rule of the county, but died before him. His wife was Matilda of Bourgogne. Their son,

- (18) Arnold II [52], was a minor at the death of his grandfather.

 His was a weak government; he lost much territory. His wife was Susanna or Rosalie, daughter of Berenger, king of Italy. Their son,
- (19) Baldwin IV [52], le Barbu, was very young when he succeeded to the government. He married, first, Ogive, daughter of Frederic, count of Luxembourg. His second wife was Eleonore, daughter of Richard III, duke of Normandy, who left no children. He began the fortification of Lille; he encouraged the commerce of Flanders, established markets or fairs in several cities. His son,

(20) Baldwin V [52], rebelled against him and forced him to flee, but Robert, duke of Normandy, restored the father to his possessions. Baldwin V finished the wall around Lille; embellished the city. He was regarded as the best prince of his times. When Henry I of France died, he was guardian of Philippe and regent. He performed these duties wisely and to his credit. His wife was Adela, daughter of Robert, king of France, by whom he had Matilda, who married William the Conqueror for her second husband.

(21) Matilda married, first, Gerbod, and had a son Gerbod and a daughter Gundred.

Gundred or Gundreda has been considered by some as the daughter of William the Conqueror. She is not mentioned as his daughter by the historians or writers of his time. William Malmesbury, William Poitiers, William of Jumieger, Orderic, and Wace, do not name her, nor is she mentioned in Domesday Book, though the other daughters of William are named by one or more of the above authorities.

As in the charters and concessions to monasteries granted by William the Conqueror and by William de Warren, to which they signed their names, and in other documents, Gundreda, in all cases except one, where her parentage is mentioned, is called daughter of Matilda; is twice called the sister of Gerbod; when called the daughter of William the Conqueror, may well have been so called because she was his step-daughter; it seems that Stapleton's claim [76] that she was the daughter of Matilda by an earlier husband is nearest the truth. It is not necessary for our purpose to consider some other questions which have been suggested in regard to this subject of Gundreda's relationship.*

(22) Gundred married William de Warren, who was cousin of William the Conqueror, his grandfather's wife having been sister to the wife of William the Conqueror's great-grandfather. He was one of the council which agreed on the invasion of England and was of material assistance to the Conqueror in subduing that country [16, Vol. VII, p. 324]. He is described as "a warlike man, fierce of courage, agile of body, excellent in renown" [54, p. 298].

William de Warren, with his wife, Gundred, started on a journey to Rome to see the Pope. The unsettled state of the European nations made it inadvisable for them to continue

their journey. They waited for a while at the monastery at Cluni and then returned to England. The kindness, consideration, and piety of the monks at Cluni so impressed them they determined to found a priory of that order in England which they did later at Lewes with the sanction of William the Conqueror. Hence two charters which are important in solving the question of the parentage of Gundred [59].

William de Warren was created earl of Surrey in 1088, by William Rufus [16, Vol. VII, p. 324]; [66]. He died 1089 from the effects of a wound received at the siege of Pevensy,

leaving a son,

- (23) William de Warren, earl of Surrey, born about 1071, who took the part of Robert against Henry I and was deprived of his earldom, which, however, was restored the next year. He married, 1118, Isabel or Elizabeth de Vermandois, widow of Robert de Bellomont, count of Meulent; but before the count's death she eloped with William, whom later she married. She was then the mother of eight children. He died, 1138, leaving a daughter,
- (24) Gundred or Gundreda, who married, first, Roger, earl of Warwick, second, William Fitz Gilbert,* who assumed the name of Lancaster [6, Vol. IV, p. 182]. They had a son,

* William Fitz Gilbert descended from Leofric I, 716-757, earl of Leicester, whose son was Algar I, whose son was Leofwins, earl of Mercia in the time of Alfred, whose son was

Leofric III, the Great, earl of Mercia about 1024 or 1032; died 1057, at Bromley; buried at Coventry [17, IV, p. 182]; married Godiva, sister of Thorold de Bohenhales. Tennyson has made her name renowned by putting into verse the tradition of her ride. The tradition as preserved in Flores Historiarum [34, Vol. I, p. 576] varies somewhat from Tennyson's version. No herald was sent forth; there was no peeping Tom.

"The pious countess, striving to liberate the city of Coventry from a heavy and base servitude, frequently importuned her husband, the count, with many prayers, that for the sake of the Holy Trinity and the Holy Mother of God he would release the city from the servitude.

"And when the count loudly upbraided her because she idly requested that which would be detrimental to himself and besides constantly forbade her addressing him concerning this thing, she, led by the obstinacy of woman, incessantly exasperated her husband with these petitions and extorted from him the following reply: 'Mount,' said he, 'your horse, naked, and pass through the market place of the city from beginning even to end, while the people are assembled, and when you return you shall obtain whatever you ask.' To which the countess replying, said, 'And if I shall be willing to do this, you will give me that which I ask?' To which the count said, 'I will give.' Then countess Godiva, loved of God, that very day, as is related, mounted her palfrey, the hair of her head, unloosed from her jewells, envailed her whole body except her most clear eyes: and having completed her journey, seen by no one, she returned to her husband, rejoicing, esteeming this for a miracle.

"Truly Count Leofric liberating the city of Coventry from the aforesaid servitude confirmed

his charter thus made by affixing his seal."

Leofric and Godiva founded, in 1043, St. Mary's Coventry, a priory for Benedictine monks. Godiva is said to have given all her treasure to this monastery. William of Malmesbury says they were buried in the two porches of their church. The picture of Earl Leofric and his lady was set up in a south window of Trinity Church in Coventry, about the time of King Richard II, the earl holding in his right hand a Charter, on which was written:

"I Lurich for love of thee Doe make Coventre tol-free." (25) William de Lancaster, living in 1176, who held a bovate of land in Lea in the time of Henry II, from which place his descendants took for their surname Lea. He married Helwise de Stuteville [16, Vol. IV, p. 182] and had a son,

(26) Henry de Lea, who settled at French Lea on the Ribble and held English Lea, also. He was living in 1208, was styled Baron of Kendal and governor of Lancaster Castle. His son was

- (27) John de Lea, living in 1244, whose son was
- (28) Henry de Lea, sheriff of Lancashire, 1283. His son was
- (29) Sir William de Lea, lord of the manor of Mollington-Banastre, Co. Chester. In right of his wife, Clemence or Clementin, daughter of Sir Robert Banastre (72), lord of Walton and Makerfield and baron of Newton. They had a daughter,
- (30) Sybell de Lea, sister and heir of her brother, Henry de Lea, who died without children in 1315. She married Sir Richard de Hoghton, knight of the shire for the county of Lancaster, in Parliaments of 1322, 1327, 1337. He greatly increased his estate by his marriage [6, Vol. IV, p. 11]. In the reign of William Rufus, the manor of Hoghton was given to Warren Russell with a daughter in marriage by Hamo Pincerna. After his death, his wife gave it to her second son, Richard. His son, Adam, styled himself Adam de Hoghton. From him descended this Sir Richard de Hoghton who married Sybell de Lea [6, Vol. IV, p. 181]. He died in 1340, leaving a son,

(31) Sir Adam de Hoghton, knight of the shire for Lancaster. had two wives, Phillippa, who, Mr. William Langton thinks, was the mother of his children, Richard, Agnes, and Sybil [Vol. I, p. 711]. His second wife was Ellen Venables, who survived him and has been thought by some to be the mother of his children. He died in 1386 and was followed by his son

(32) Sir Richard de Hoghton, who was returned as knight of the shire for Lancaster in 1383, 1403. He died 1415. His wife was Joanna Radcliff, daughter of Sir Richard de Radcliff. Their daughter, Margaret, married Sir John Southworth, son of Sir Gilbert de Southworth (see p. 425). Their son was

(33) Sir William de Hoghton, M.P. 1383, 1402, 1411, who died in his father's lifetime. He married Alicia --- and had a son,

Leofric's son was Algar III, whose two sons were killed in the contests against William the Conqueror. His daughter and heiress, Lucy, obtained the parental estates and married Yvon Taylboys, earl of Angiers in France, and baron of Kendal. Monasticon [59, III, p. 192] gives her no children by Taylboys, but mentions the children by her second and third husbands. James Croston [6, IV, p. 182] mentions a son Eltret or Ughtud, living in 1106, as if he were the son of Yvon Taylboys. Documents given by Gregson [42, p. 262] confirm Croston.

Eltret's or Ughtud's son was Ketel or Chetel, whose son was Gilbert, whose son was William

Fitz Gilbert.

- (34) Sir Richard de Hoghton, born 1401; died before 1468. His wife was Margaret. From them are descended the Hoghtons of Hoghton Tower. Their daughter was
- (35) Alicia de Hoghton, who married William de Stanley, Esq.,* of Stanley, Storeton, and Hooton. The first Lord Stanley lived forty or fifty years before William the Conqueror. He had an only daughter, Mabel, who married Adam Audley, son of Lidulph Audley, who came with William the Conqueror. Their son Henry, in right of his mother, became Lord of Stonely and Balterley. Adam Audley gave Stonely to his uncle, William Audithley, who called himself Stanley. His wife was Joan Bamville, who learned that her parents were determined that she should marry contrary to her inclination. While her father was at a festive banquet given him by some friends, she stole away, met William de Stanley; they rode across country to Astbey Church, where they were married in the presence of two friends [6]. From him descended Sir William Stanley,† the tenth male heir [71, pp. 1–9]. Their son
- (36) William Stanley, sheriff of Chester, 1463 to 1519. He married Margaret Bromley, daughter of Sir John Bromley, of Badington. Their daughter was
- (37) Margaret Stanley, who married Peter Gerard, Esq., ‡ of Kingsley and Bryn, Co. Lancaster, to whom she brought the estate of Gerard's Bromley [61, Vol. II, p. 230]. Their daughter was
- (38) Isabel Gerard, who married Richard Langton. § Their daughter was
- (39) Helen (Ellen) Langton, who married Sir John Southworth.
- * William de Stanley's descent can be traced from Isabel de Vermandois, who married, second, William de Warren [30]. By her first husband, Robert de Bellomont, she had a son, Robert Bossu de Bellomont, second earl of Leicester. The descent from him is given in the chart of the Southworth pedigree.

† There is some discrepancy in authorities.

- ‡ Peter Gerard was descended from Otho or Other, said to have been of the family of the Gherardini, dukes of Tuscany. Otho's son was named in Domesday Book (1088) as tenant of lands in Berks, Bucks, Middlesex, and Surrey [20]. Peter Gerard's pedigree is given in the chart.
- § Richard Langton was Knight Banneret at Hutton Field in 1482. He descended from Robert Banastre [15, p. 268; 1, p. 706] named in the Roll of Battle Abbey [8] among those who came over at the Conquest. (See 68.)

DESCENT OF THE SOUTHWORTHS FROM PEPIN LE GROS AND CHARLEMAGNE.

- (40) The Southworths are descended from Pepin le Gros through two lines. Pepin made himself master of Austrasia. While continually fighting he promoted the prosperity of his people. He repudiated his lawful wife, Plectrude, daughter of Hugobert, and married Aldelaide, by whom he had Charles Martel and Childebrand. He died in 714, and immediately after his death Plectrude confined Charles. Martel at Cologne [52, Vol. V, p. 416].
- (41) Charles Martel, who was about thirty years old, escaped from prison in 715 and was chosen Duke of Austrasia. He died in 741. His wife was Rotrude, who had [52, Vol. V, p. 420]
- (42) Pepin and Carloman. The latter became a monk and lived in Rome. In 752, Pepin caused himself to be crowned. He died in 768. He "united in his person all the qualities of heart and spirit which make great kings and may legalize in some sort in a usurper the exercise of sovereign power." "He contributed to the progress of religion, he favored missionaries, he was protector of the Holy See, and the creator of its temporal power."

He married Bertha or Bertrade, daughter of Caribert, count of Leon. His son,

- (43) Charles, born 742, called "the Great," or "Charlemagne," divided the kingdom with his brother Carloman. He had five wives. By Hildegarde he had Louis le Debonnaire; by Liutgarde, Pepin le Bossu. The extension of his power and kingdom is generally known.
- (44) Louis le Debonnaire had a varied fortune. His sons by his first wife conspired against him, made him prisoner, but he regained his liberty and kingdom. He sent Pepin, who was most bitterly opposed to him, into Italy [52, Vol. V, p. 460–486]. He married, first, Hermangarde, daughter of Ingerrame, duke of Harbarge, by whom he had three sons, Lothaire, Pepin, and Louis.* He married, second, Judith, daughter of Welphe (Guelph), count of Bavaria, by whom he had
- (45) Charles the Bald, who after the death of his half brother, Pepin, succeeded to the throne of France, 840. He married Her-

^{*} Louis, called le Germanique [876], was king of Bavaria; was followed by his son Carloman who had no legitimate son. His nobles chose his natural son Arnoulf as king of Germany. His daughter married Otho, duke of Saxony [77], their son, Henry I, le Oisseleux, the Fowler, was elected emperor of Germany [66, p. 134]. Henry I married Mathilde, daughter of Count Ingelheim, and their daughter, Hedwig, married Hugh the Great, count of Paris (63).

mentrude, daughter of Eudes (Odo), count of Orleans, by

whom he had a daughter.

- (46) Judith, who married, first, Ethelwulf, king of Wessex, two years before his death; after which she returned to the continent, to Bladwin I, count of Flanders, who married her without her father's consent. Charles was much incensed at this, but later was reconciled with his son-in-law and gave him, 863, territory in the vicinity of Lys and Escant. He took the name of Count of Flanders. Their son was Baldwin II. (See 15.) [52.]
- (47) Pepin le Bossu, one of the sons of Charlemagne. His son was
- (48) Bernard, king of Italy, who left a son [52, Vol. XII. p. 178, et seg.].
- (49) Pepin, who was deprived of his kingdom of Italy by Louis le Debonnaire and received in compensation a part of Vermandois. His wife is unknown. He died, 840, leaving a son,
- (50) Herbert I, first count of Vermandois, who was a poor ruler. His son was
- (51) Herbert II, count of Vermandois. In 915, he conspired with others of the nobility against Charles the Simple. He died, 943. He married Hildebrante, daughter of Robert, duke of France, count of Paris [52]. (See 62.) Their second son, (52) Albert I, who succeeded his father, was faithful to Charles till
- he saw that Hughes Capet had him in his power, and then he took sides with the stronger. He died, 987. His wife was Gerberge, daughter of Louis d'Outremer, king of France. His son was
- (53) Herbert III, fourth count of Vermandois (died about 1000), whose wife was Hermengarde. His second son was
- (54) Otton, died, 1045; his son was
- (55) Herbert IV, died, 1080. His daughter was
- (56) Adelaide, who inherited from her father the county of Vermandois and Valois. She married Hughes le Grand, second son of Henry I, king of France. He went on the crusade to the Holy Land and died at Tarsus from wounds received in battle. Their daughter.
- (57) Elizabeth or Isabel, married, first, Robert de Bellomont or Beaumont, Count Meulent, who came to England with William the Conqueror. Their son was Robert Bossu. She forsook her husband in his old age and eloped with William de Warren (23), son of William de Warren, earl of Surrey, whom she later married for her second husband (23) [52]. (See note to 35.)

(68) Robert Banastre is mentioned in the Roll of Battle Abbey,†
having come over with William the Conqueror. [8.] He had

* She has been confounded with Adelaide, daughter of Otto, emperor of Germany, who entered a convent. [52, 7, p. 307; 77.]

† The roll of Battle Abbey was a list of the Norman knights who followed William the Conqueror to England. It is said to have been made before he embarked. As William was about to join battle at Hastings he vowed that if victorious he would build an abbey on that spot. When built it was called Battle S. Martin Abbey. The roll of knights was deposited in the abbey, which is usually called Battle Abbey. The monks on special occasions read the roll of names of his companions in the church.

Some names were added later on payment of money to the monks. Several copies were made. When the abbey was suppressed under Henry VIII, the roll was carried to Cowdray and was burned in the great fire of 1793.

- (69) Robert Banastre, who built a tower on the coast, the foundations of which are said to be still distinguishable. When the Welsh, under Owen Gwenerh, regained possession of that district, he withdrew with all his people into Lancashire, where they were given lands and held extensive possessions under the Earl of Chester. They were called "les Westroys." He had Walton-in-le-Dale by grant of Henry de Lacy, and Makersfield [42, Vol. XXIV, pp. 95–97]; his son was

The earl of Lancaster in giving his ward, Alice Banastre, to John Langton, calls him his very dear friend, "Amico n'r Karissimo". [17, p. 267]. She was living in 1304. Their son was
- (75) Sir Robert de Langton, Knt., 1330; died, 1361 [1, p. 707]. His son,
- (76) John de Langton, died before his father. His son,
- (77) Sir Ralph de Langton, Knt., married Johanna de Radcliffe.
 Their son was
- (78) Henry de Langton; married, about 1391, Agnes Davenport, daughter of John de Davenport. His son,
- (79) Sir Ralph de Langton, aet. twenty-three in 1419. He died, 1431. His son,
- (80) Henry de Langton, aet. twelve in 1432. He died, 1471; his son,
- (81) Sir Richard de Langton, was made knight banneret at Hutton Fields in 1482. He married Isabella, daughter of Peter Gerard, of Byrn. He died, 1500. Their daughter was Helen de Langton, who married Sir John Southworth. (See 39.) [1, p. 706, et 17, p. 268.]

DESCENT OF THE SOUTHWORTHS FROM VLADIMIR I, CZAR OF

- (82) Vladimir I was one of three sons left by Sviatoslaf. His mother was a slave, but his father treated him as the equal of his brothers. After the father's death the brothers fought. Vladimir conquered. He took as wife Rogneda, the betrothed of his brother, and also one of that brother's wives. He extended his empire by conquest. Dissatisfied with his ancient heathen religion, he set out for Constantinople, determined to conquer Christianity for himself. He agreed, 988, to take Anne, sister of the Byzantine emperor, as his wife and to adopt Christianity. He was baptized, restored the Greek cities he had captured, and returned to his own kingdom with priests, religious books, and vestments, to convert his empire to Christianity. He ordered all the inhabitants of his capital. Kief, men, women, and children, to enter the river naked. He and the priest stood on the bluff overlooking the river. The priest read the baptismal service, and lo! they were all baptized Christians. However much we may be amused at these crude ideas, Vladimir was a changed man. He strove no more to make conquests; he became a mild, gentle, just ruler, established markets, favored commerce, and elevated his subjects. He was so gentle that the priests were compelled to remind him that criminals ought to be punished for the good of others and for their own good. Since then Russia has been a Christian nation. He died in 1015, leaving a son by Rogneda* [47, Vol. I, p. 252].
- (83) Jaroslaf succeeded his father, conquering his adopted brother. He was generous to his friends and enemies, and devoted himself to promoting public welfare. He was tolerant of pagans; promoted and extended Christianity; he codified the Russian laws, adorned Kief, built churches, established markets, favored commerce. In his religious zeal he caused the bones of his uncle to be disinterred and baptized.

He married Enguerherde, daughter of Olaf, king of Norway. When that king was driven out of his kingdom by Knute, in 1028, Jaroslaf gave him asylum [70, p. 205]. He died in 1055, leaving a daughter by Enguerhede,

(84) Anne, who married Henry I of France (66).

APPENDIX II, TO CHAPTER IV

In March, 1777, he enlisted again from the same place, in Captain ——Couche's company, Col. Enos Rogers' regiment, serving eight months. He enlisted also in 1778 or 1779 from Sharon and in 1780 from Rutland, Vt. In 1832, when seventy-three years old, he applied for a pension, which was granted.
